vould come sometime, has been here and gone, leaving behind a sad memento of its day morning, Sept. 8th, was broken by the cry of fire! fire! and people rushed to the centre of the village to find the barns and stable of the Morris House a mass of flames, so flercely burnon fire before anything could be done .-The engine was on hand inside of three minutes and the hose attached to hydrant No. 4, corner of Main and Broad streets, but the fire was too large for us to control, and all attempts to save the hurning buildings was given up and attention given to those on the other side of the road, and to this end the engine was drawn up in front of D. I. Laurence's house, the hose attached to hydrant No. 2, corner Church street: the hose was then laid down Main street in front of the buildings on the south side of Main street, and a stream of water kept on them for over an hour. From Potters' store the flames spread to D. I. Laurence's drug store, then C. H. Lawrence's residence. Chas. A. Bowne's building, occupied by C. H. Lawrence on the first floor as a meat market, the second by Bowne & Barber, lawyers, and by the Good Templars on the third floor; the Bunn building came next, occupied by L. A. Hewel as a residence, grocery and restaurant. Here the brook stopped the fire, with the help of water and wet carpets on D. I. Laurence's house, just across the brook. The hotel barns also set fire to Lynn Lawrence this Monday evening Mrs. N. Moore's house andbarn on Broad street, and also to Stephen Warren's Cooper shop building, but here it was stopped. The flames on the Cooper shop were extinguished with a small band engine and pails of water thrown from the inside, also, Mr. Warren's house, though badly scorched, was saved by wet carpets and almost super-human efforts, and the same


