Albany, April 12.—Dealing with undreds of thousands, of auton sts and aiding in running down hundreds of stolen cars, through his records, Frank Wenzel, chief of one of the State's motor vehicle bureaus, has just invented and patented a contrivance which may be adpated by the State as a means of putting a stop to what has become an almost wholesale stealing of cars. Stolen cars last year showed an increase of

22 per cent over 1918.

The device consists of a spilt metal try. shell, fitting around the rim of the steering wheel. Over this shell a ard waxlike substance is to be moulded and in which the motor numper of the car and the State seal appear, while on the reverse side there will be imbedded a number representing the key number co-ordinating with the motor number. The key number will be secret data in the State registration bureau.

Through its use, a stolen car could not be registered or sold by a thief. Any attemnt at registration or trans fer is quickly detected and all in the device appears to be about the best thing that has yet been brought orward to meet the situation.
