## WILLIAM ELLIOTT DEAD

William Elliott died at his home in New Lisbon on the 8th of April 1922.

His health began to decline some ten years ago, and for the past two years he had been an invalid.

He was the son of William Elliott and Isabella Hall, and was born in the town of Pittsfield, April 10, 1861.

He was married to Jennie E. Hurlbutt, March 13, 1890, and she, with their only son, Edward H., survive.

Three brothers, James of Sidney, Thomas and George, and a sister, Dorothy, all of Pittsfield, a nephew, of New Berlin, and three nieces, of Whitney's Point also survive.

Mr. Elliott has resided on the farm where he died for about thirty years, and had improved and brought the same up to a high state of production.

Before his illness Mr. Elliott was an expert hunter and was well and favorably known as such.

Of a genial and kindly disposition, his advice and assistance was often sought by neighbors and was cheerfully given.

The sympathy of an extended acquaintance goes out to the bereaved family.

Funeral services were conducted at the house on the 12th inst., by Rev. J. C. Calhoun of Garrattsville, pastor of the Presbyterian church, of which Mr. Elliott was a member.

Interment was in Hillington cemetery in Morris.
