PRIZES

Prizes to be awarded June, 1954, for achievement during the school year

THE JAMES R. MORRIS AMERICAN HISTORY ESSAY PRIZES, established in 1903 by Dr. Lewis R. Morris in memory of his father. Only high school students who have five or more academic units are eligible. The essays will be judged by the following score:

THE REVEREND GEORGE H. STERLING SCHOLARSHIP PRIZE, established by Reverend George H. Sterling and continued in his memory by his nephew, W. L. Sterling. A prize of \$10 to be awarded to that student of the senior class maintaining the highest scholarship in his fourth year of high school. A prize of \$10 to be awarded to that student of the junior class maintaining the highest scholarship for the year.

THE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION SCHOLARSHIP PRIZE of \$5 to be awarded to that second year high school student maintaining the highest scholarship for the year, and a \$5 prize to that first year high school student maintaining the highest scholarship.

DR. W. D. JOHNSON ASSOCIATION PRIZES to be awarded for the greatest effort put forth by members of the senior class. First prize will be \$3 and second prize \$2.

THE EDWIN E. CARPENTER PRIZE, maintained by Mr. Frank C. Carpenter in memory of his father. A prize of \$10 will be given to that member of the senior class who most clearly manifested excellent scholarship, combined with best evidence of responsibility to his obligations as a student in and out of the class room. Selection will be made by ballot, in which the principal shall have one vote, the faculty shall have one vote, and the members of the senior class shall have one vote.

THE AMERICAN LEGION MEDALS, awarded by the Butternut Valley Post to that boy in the senior class judged the highest in cooperation, honor, service, leadership and scholarship. A like medal will be awarded to a girl in the senior class.

THE HENRY R. WASHBON BIBLICAL INFORMATION PRIZE of \$10 is awarded to that high school student who makes the highest rating on a biblical information examination.

THE HENRY R. WASHEON GENERAL INFORMATION PRIZE of \$10 is awarded to that high school student who makes the highest rating on a general information examination.

BECKER JUNIOR COLLEGE KEY awarded to that student whose achievement in the commercial department is outstanding.

THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION ELEMENTARY HISTORY PRIZE of \$2 given to the student with the highest standing elementary social studies regents provided the mark is at least 90%.

THE JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL PRIZES DONATED BY DR. H. W. NAYLOR. A first prize of \$5 and a second prize of \$3 will be awarded in both seventh and eighth grades for excellence in scholarship in daily work and tests.

THE "READERS DIGEST" - one year subscription to Valedictorian.

THE NATIONAL ARION FOUNDATION MEDALS awarded by Morris Rotary to a Senior in Band and by Jewell Chapter O.E.S. to a Senior in Glee Club who have contributed most to the organization during their high school careers. Selection being made by fellow students and music director.

THE MEMBERS OF THE HARRIS CRANDALL REUNION, prize of \$5 for highest regents mark in mathematics, provided the mark is 90% or above. In case of a tie, the prize will go to the student with the highest estimate during the year. The prize money will be cumulative in case no one qualifies.

THE MERRITT L. AND ANNA M. BRIDGES PRIZES, donated by Maurice Bridges in memory of his father and mother. In each of the grades 4, 5, and 6, a first prize of \$5 and a second prize of \$3 will be given, based on highest general scholarship.

THE LOUISVILLE GRANGE PRIZE of \$5 in Agriculture to the 9th or 10th grade student showing the best promise in Agriculture.
