Brigham Funeral Is Today

Oneonta — Funeral services for Russell E. Brigham, 86, were scheduled at 2 o'clock this afternoon in the First Presbyterian Church in Oneonta.

Officiating was the Rev. Merlin A. Dittmer, Jr., pastor, assisted by the Rev. Boyd C. McCleary, pastor emeritus. Burial will be later in Glenwood Cemetery.

MR. BRIGHAM, a jeweler and a former mayor of Oneonta, died Tuesday afternoon at General Hospital in Allentown, Pa.

He was stricken early in the morning of Jan. 15 at the Holiday Inn near Allentown, where he had stopped with friends while en route to Florida.

Mr. Brigham, a native of Burlington, Pa., had been in the jewelry business in Oneonta for 71 years.

He began working in a jewelry store at Athens, Pa., in 1893 and later lived in Waverly and Schuylerville before coming to Oneonta in 1903.

MR. BRIGHAM was mayor of Oneonta from Nov. 10, 1943, through Dec. 31, 1944, by appointment of the Common Council.

He had been an alderman and was named Mayor after the deaths of Mayor Daniel Franklin and Mayor Dorr S. Hickey.

Mr. Brigham had been a member of Oneonta Lodge 466, F&AM, for more than a half-century.

He was an elder of the First Presbyterian Church, a charter member of the Kiwanis Club, and was affiliated with the Citizens Board and Century Club at Hartwick College, the Oneonta Country Club and the Elks Club.

MR. BRIGHAM also was a member of the State Jewelers Association, and had served as its treasurer for more than 25 years.

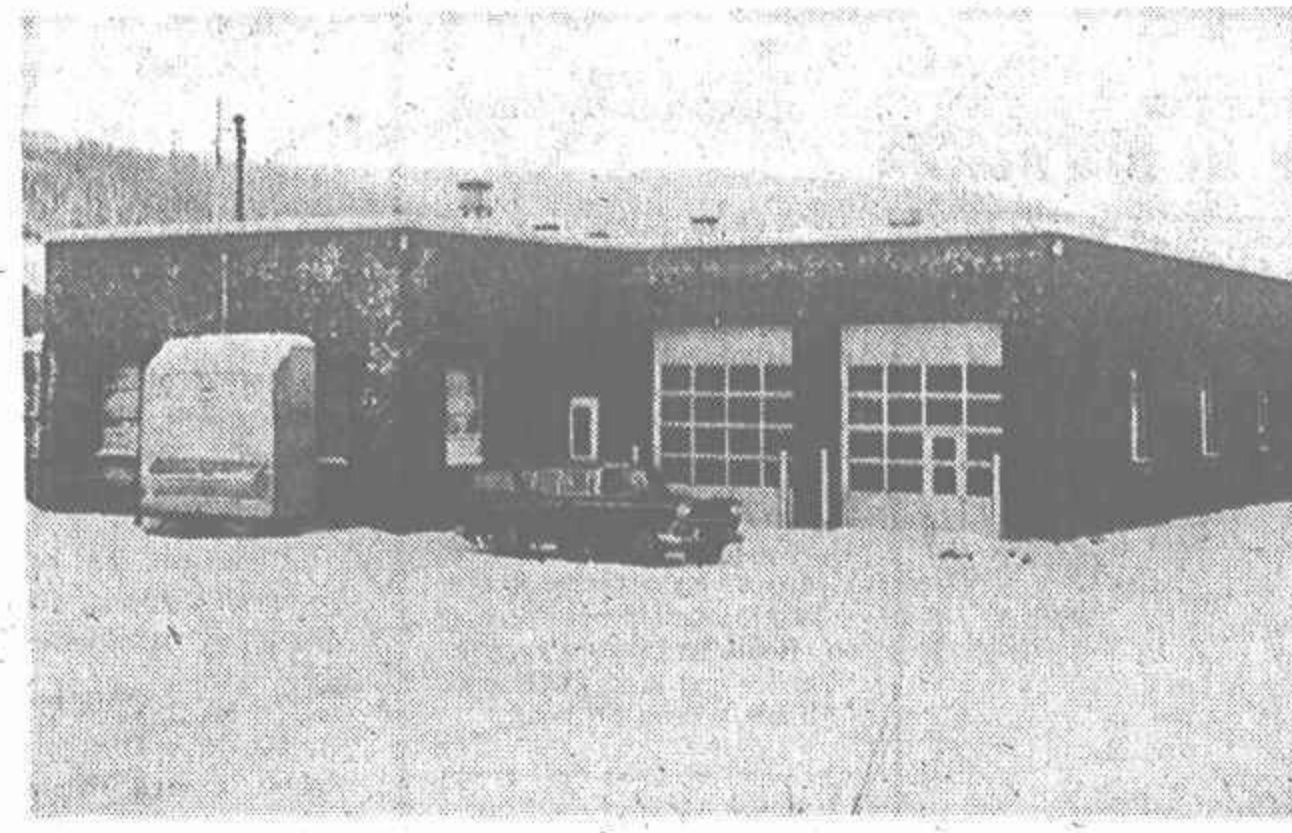

Oneonta—Economic impact of State University College, Hartwick College and Homer Folks Hospital is about \$7,825,000 annually on Oneonta and the area.

Mayor Albert S. Nader underscored value of the institutions to the community in his annual message to the Common Council.

"I am sure these figures are most revealing to many of our citizens," he said. "We don't know the riches of our own house."

Mayor Nader pointed to these economic benefits derived from the colleges and the hospital:

HOMER FOLKS HOSPITAL, a state institution, has 239 employees with an annual payroll of \$1,605,000.

HARTWICK COLLEGE has 218 employees, including faculty, with a total annual payroll of \$810,000.

STATE UNIVERSITY COLLEGE has 387 employees, including 232 faculty, with an annual payroll of \$2,500,000.

SLATER FOOD SYSTEM at Hartwick College has 28 employees and an annual payroll of more than \$60,000.

SLATER FOOD SYSTEM at State University College has 60 employees with an annual payroll of \$130,000.

Mayor Nader said statistics indicate each student at the colleges spends or has spent a minimum of \$20 weekly for services, clothing, entertainment, food and lodging.

"Combining the enrollments of Hartwick and SUC, it can safely be estimated that the students of these two colleges spend \$68,000 each week," he declared. "Most of this money stays in the city."

ON THE BASIS of Mayor Nader's reasoning, students at Hartwick and SUC would spend or have spent for them a total of \$2,720,000 during the 40 weeks annually they are attending classes in Oneonta.

Mayor Nader mentioned economic benefits of the institutions in reminding aldermen that the City of Oneonta completed nearly \$1,000,000 worth of capital improvements in 1963.

Of the total cost, taxpayers of Oneonta will pay about \$450,000, with the balance to be underwritten by the Federal Government under the Public Works Acceleration Act.

INCLUDED IN THE capital improvements were extension of sewer services, extension of water lines, reconstruction of Bugbee Road, and repair of West Street and Hartwick College Drive.

"With the reconstruction of these roads (West Street has yet to be completed) we will have fulfilled our promise to improve the routes to both colleges and to Homer Folks Hospital," Mayor Nader said.

"The extension of water and sewer lines will bring considerable benefits to all the citizens of this community," he continued.

"These improvements have helped to make possible the expansion of both the Hartwick and SUC campus," Mayor Nader declared.

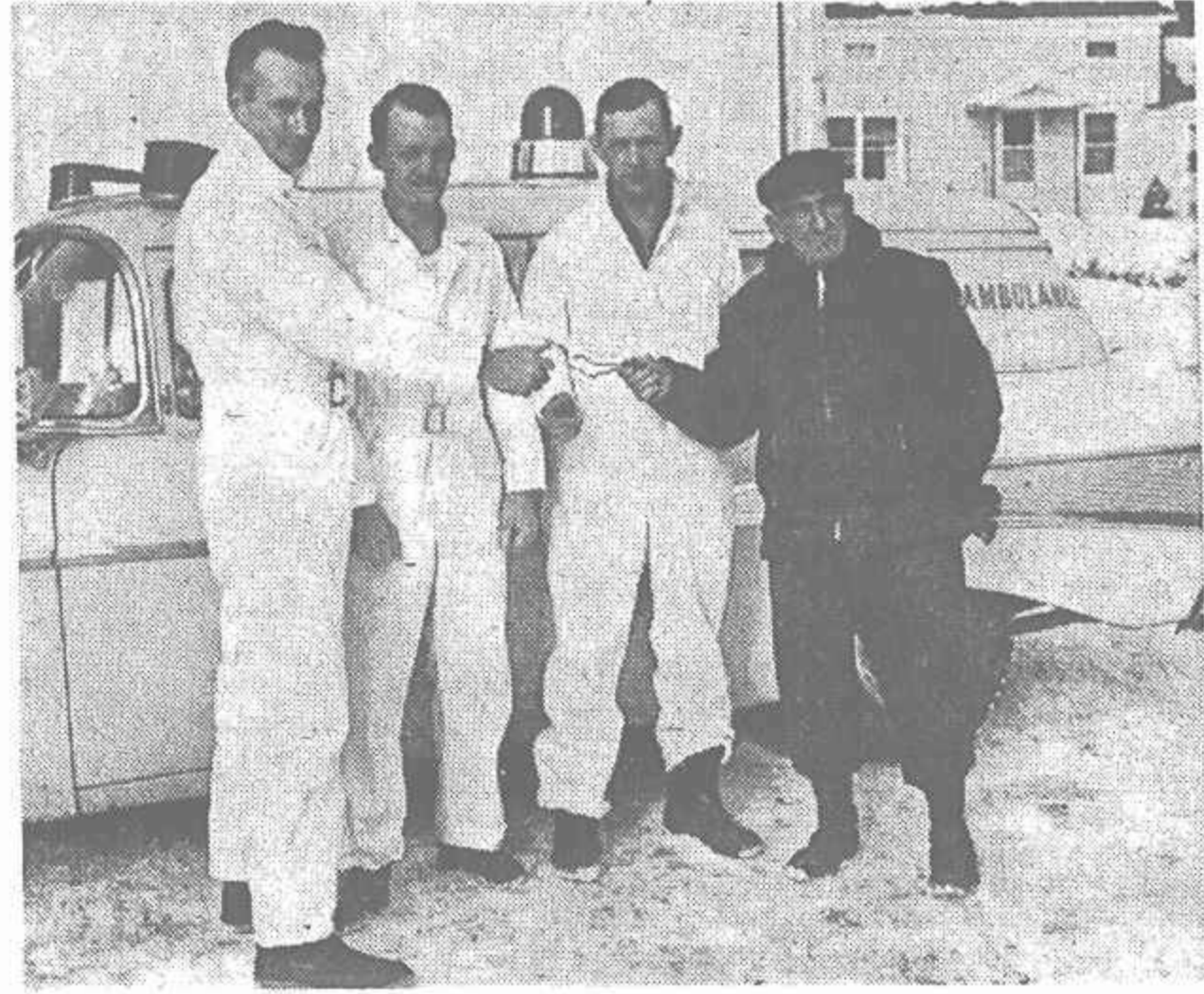

Services of the squad, which are free, are available to persons who telephone the Morris operator, state the nature of the emergency, give their name and location, he explained.

LAST FALL, the squad sponsored a 16-week Red Cross First Aid training course, which was completed Dec. 21.

Captain Pickens said the squad is available for first aid demonstrations before civic groups.

The ambulance used by the squad originally was purchased by public subscription and operated by the Village of Morris.
