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Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.
 Question: I want to make a contribution to my political party. Can I deduct it on my tax return?
 Answer: No, the law does not allow an individual to take a deduction for contributions to political parties.
 Question: I made a profit when I sold my house. Is it true I won't have to pay tax on it if I use the money to buy another house?
 Answer: On the sale of a personal residence, the tax on any gain from the sale is postponed providing you purchase and occupy another home within a year at a price equal to or greater than the "adjusted" sale price of your old home. This section of the law is discussed at length in IRS Document 5017, Selling Your Home. Send a post card to your District Director for a free copy.
 Question: I'm buying U. S. savings bonds to help pay for my son's education. How should I go about this so I don't have to pay tax on the interest?
 Answer: The interest earned on a savings bond should be reported by the owner of the bond. If you purchase the bonds in your child's name as owner then any tax liability will be his. Unless the interest earned on the bonds and his other income amounts to \$600 or more, no return need be filed by him.
 If you have your child elect to report the bond interest each year rather than wait until the year they are cashed in, then your child should file a return showing this bond interest. No further return will be required until the child has \$600 or more income a year. Keep a copy of this first return to show that the interest has been reported on a yearly basis.
 The transaction is a gift to your son. If you give more

than \$3000 to him during the year, you may be liable for Federal gift tax return.

Question: I claim my two daughters as dependents even though they live with my former wife. Can I still claim them for withholding purposes?
 Answer: Yes, you can, if they qualify as your dependents. As a general rule, you may take as many exemptions for withholding purposes as you claim when you file your return.

Question: On my job I get paid on a commission basis. Is it right for my boss to be taking Federal tax out of what I earn?
 Answer: Yes. Earnings from commissions are subject to the same withholding requirements as wages and salaries.

Question: When is the next Social Security tax report on household employees due?
 Answer: October was the filing deadline for third quarter reports on household employees.
