### Farmers' Museum To Hold Annual Junior Show In Cooperstown

The Thirty-Ninth Annual Farmers' Museum Junior Show will

be held at Iroquois Farm on River Road, Cooperstown, Monday and Tuesday, July 14 and 15, 1968. The program, featuring 4-H Club and F. F. A. exhibits and showmanship competitions is open to the general public. The show ends on Tuesday afternoon, with a Parade of Champions and award ceremony.

Members of 4-H clubs and F. F. A. between eight and nineteen years old will show their animals, either dairy, beef, swine, or sheep. Participants are from the counties of Otsego, Delaware, Montgomery, Herkimer, Chenango and Schoharie.

The top awards offered are The Farmers' Museum Cup and the F. Ambrose Clark Livestock Trophy. The Farmer's Museum Cup is awarded annually for the dairy animal judged to be best of the show. It has been awarded every year since 1947. The Clark Livestock Trophy is awarded for the beef, swine, or sheep judged to be best. This is the twenty-third year it has been given.

Premiums are awarded to animals of merit in several classes. Five dairy breeds have a grand champion and three livestock breeds also have a grand champion.

The annual livestock show is one of many educational programs sponsored by The Farmers' Museum. Through school programs, exhibitions, crafts demonstration and a living historic farm, the museum portrays nineteenth-century life. The Farmers' Museum, on Lake Road in Cooperstown, is open daily from 9 am to 6 pm. Free parking is available. An admission is charged. For information write, The Farmers' Museum, P. O.
