

### Infant Son, Worcester Man Injured

Binghamton Press Bureau Oneonta-A Marine Corps officer and his wife were killed and two others, including their infant son, were injured early today in an apparent headon crash in Route 7 near East Worcester.

Killed instantly was Lt. John E. Tilley, 26, of Burlington, Vt., who was pinned in his late model Volkswakon convertible. His wife, Portia, who suffered multiple injuries, died later at Community Hospital in Cobleskill.

The couples' six-month-old son, John, Jr., who received a fractured leg and other injuries, is reported in satisfactory condition at the hospital in Cobleskill. In similar condition at the same hospital is Martin A. Ralph, 24, of Worcester, who was driving the second car involved. His injuries were not determined immediately. -Binghamton Press Photo,







