PWA Officials Angered Over School Delay

Withdrawal From North High Indicated if Council Doesn't Act

WORK AT STANDSTILL

\$175,000 for Equipment, \$30,000 for Grading Hanging Fire

Withdrawal of PWA from Binghamton's new \$1,000,000 North High school project was viewed as "imminent" today, unless a "prompt and substantial program is resumed immediately."

Under the original PWA contract, the government contributes 45 per cent of the construction, grading and equipment costs. So far, City Council has blocked the issuance of \$175,000 for equipment and has not approved a proposed \$30,000 grading program.

"Work today," said acting City Manager John E. Hogan, "is at a standstill." "A representative of PWA has inferred that withdrawal from the project is imminent unless a prompt and substantial program is resumed immediately," said Mr. Hogan.
