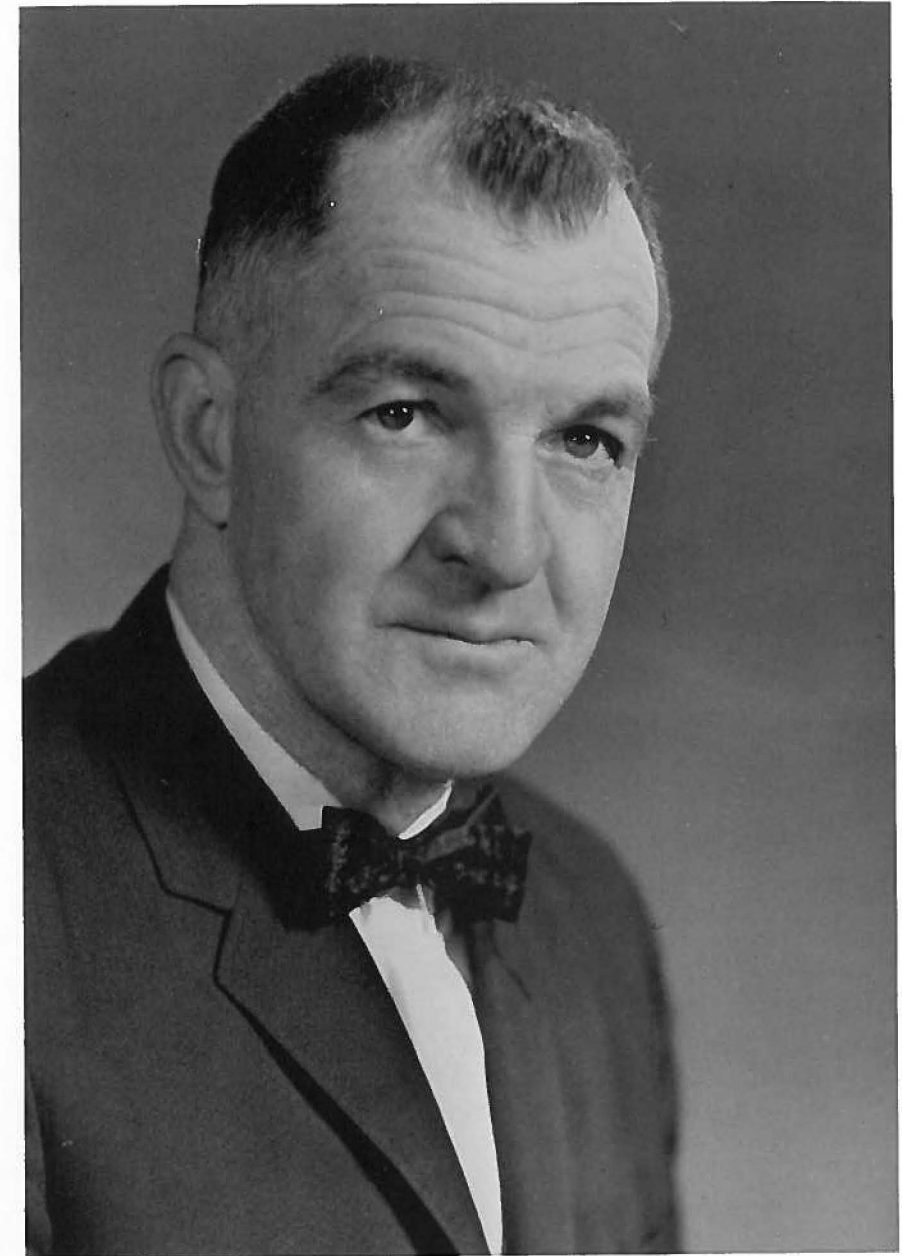
## *Principal's Message*
