
In recent years, a popular attitude has been that "bigger is better." Students at Morris Central School might well dispute that view, however, since small schools, like small towns, have their own special charm.

The school therefore is an extension of the community, promoting closeness and co-operation, and concerned with the community's youngest citizens.


















Seniors Dedicate Yearbook to Two Teachers













G'ville Borrows MCS Wrestlers






Team Wins Tourney








1974 Members Set New Records

All except three school track and field records were broken in 1974, and returning to this year's team will be several of the current record-holders.







AV Club, F.H.A. Offer Service and Fun






Safety Patrol Aids Students, Serves School








ADMINISTRATION FACULTY STAFF
