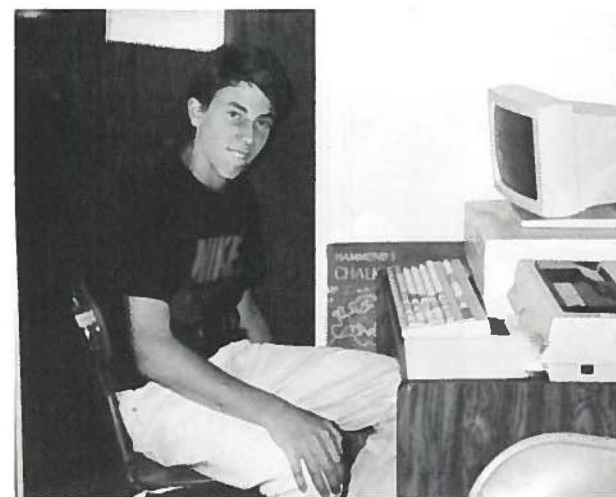
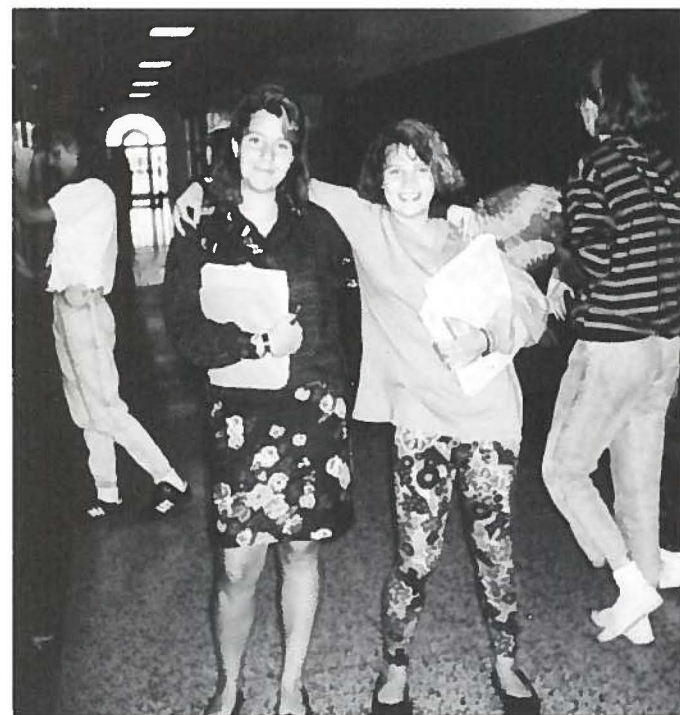
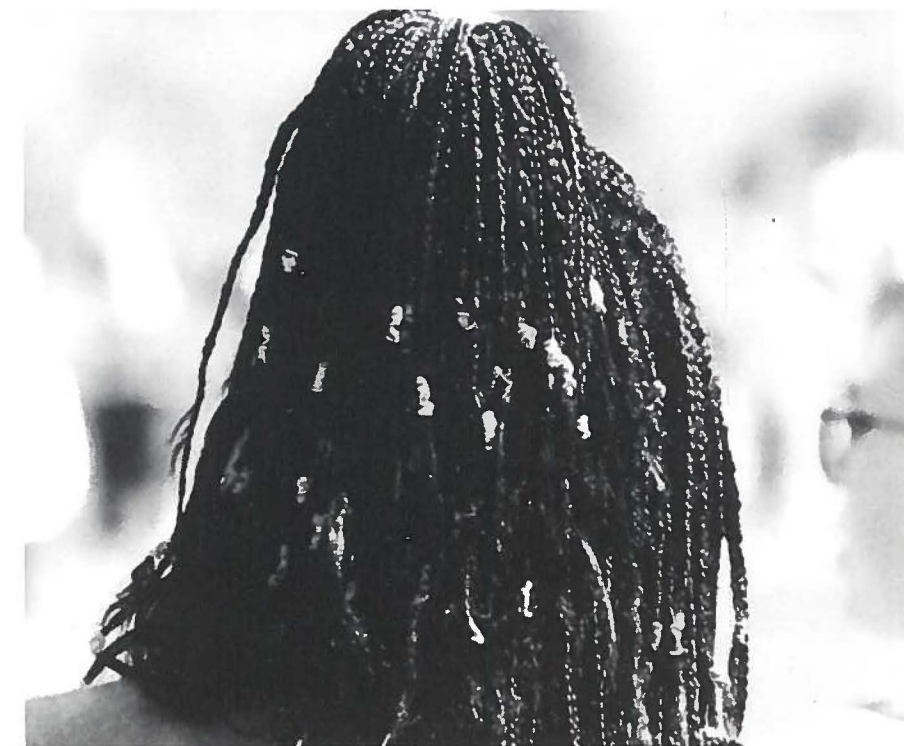
The boys are wearing basketball shirts such as Chicago Bulls TShirts or Nike Air shirts. You can find a sports shirt everyday in the halls of MCS.

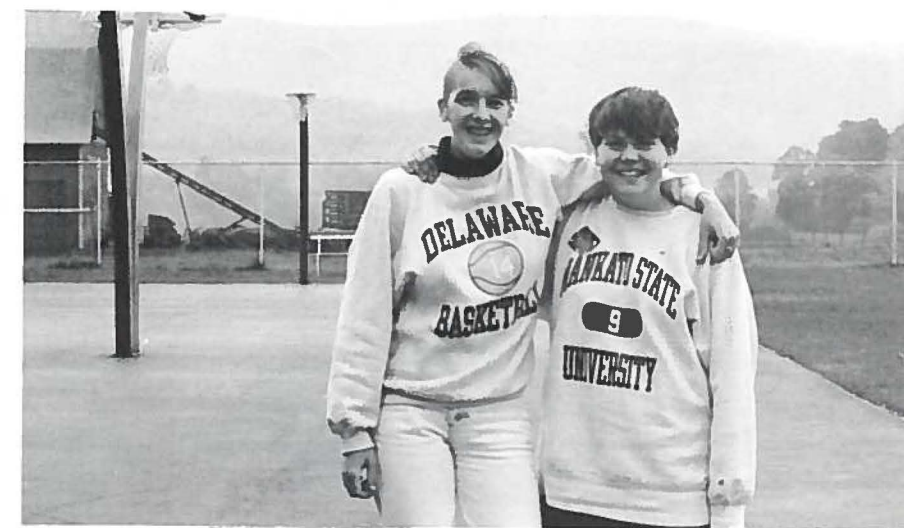

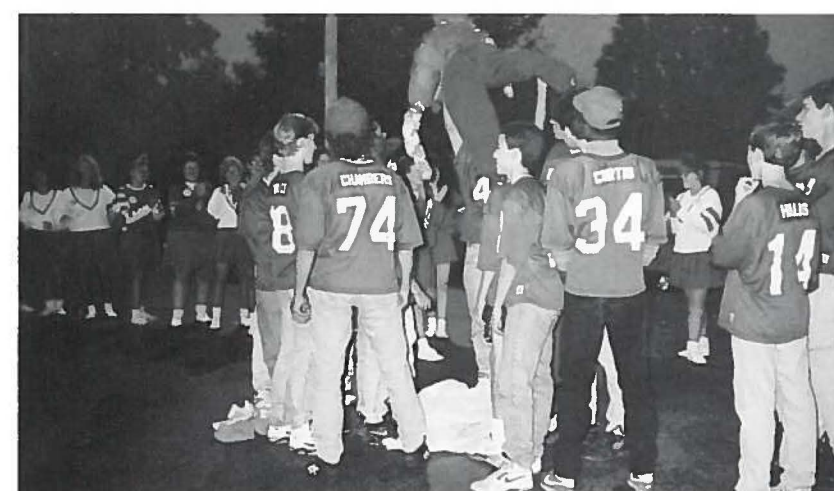
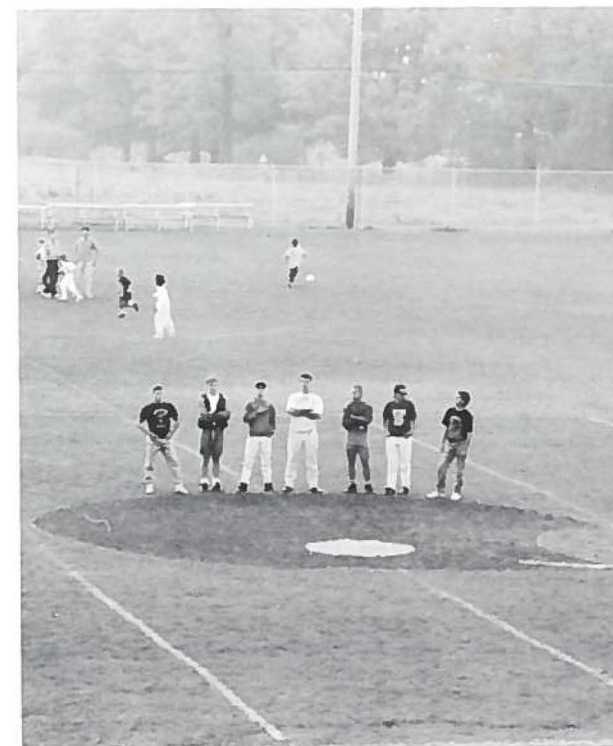

Miss Steverson and Mrs. Kristofik have offered SAT prep courses in both verbal and math. The extra prep can only help when students confront the SAT exam in the summer.

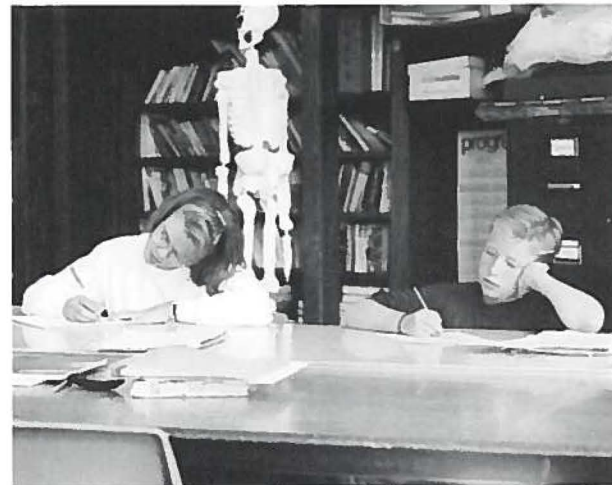
Mrs. McMullen is also teaching fifth grade keyboarding this year. The students are really enjoying using the Macs.

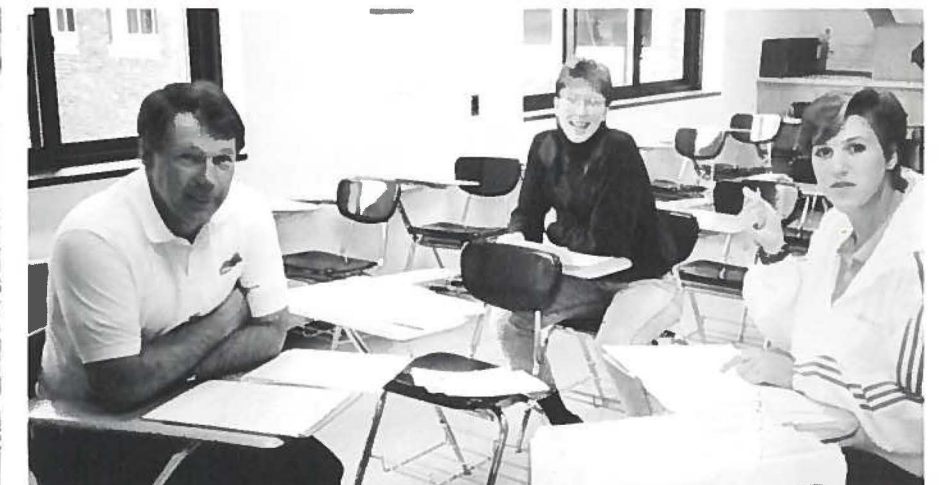

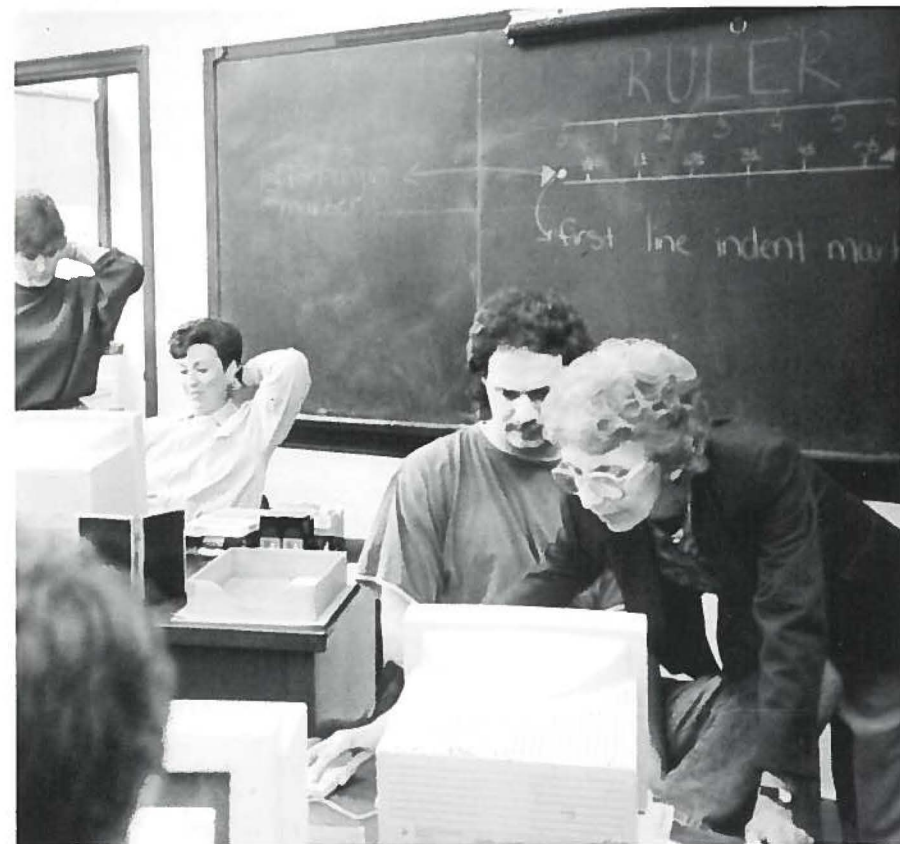

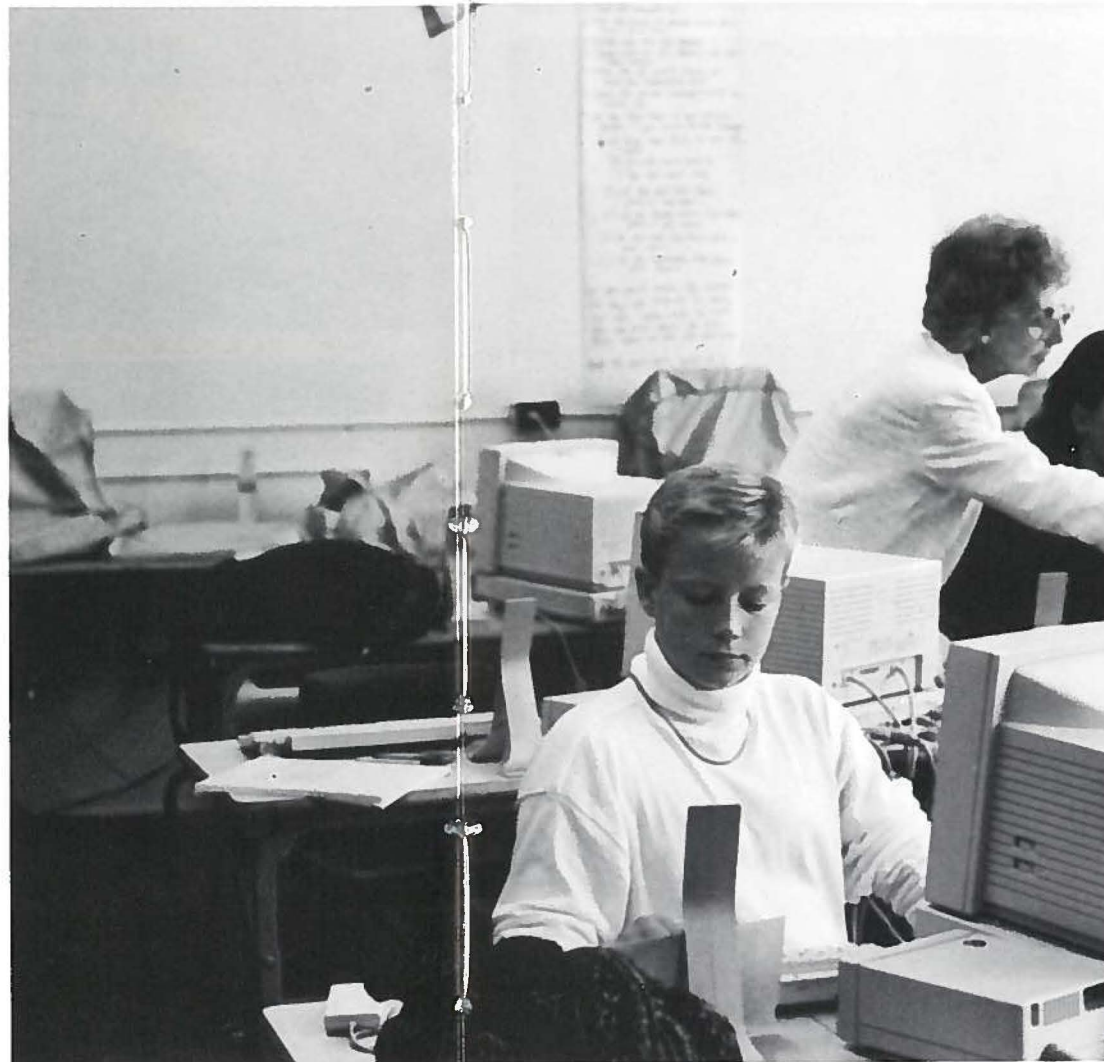

This year at MCS we have a new computer room, with a new teacher, Mrs. McMullen. We have come so far from last year. Instead of typewriters, our advanced computer room has twenty-one computers and nine printers. We have fifteen new MacIntosh LC Computers, with four printers, four compuAdd computers, which are IBM compatible, with four printers, and one older Apple Computer and printer.

The business program this year includes accounting and keyboarding. These classes have an advantage over previous years. This is because in previous years, all we had were old typewriters that didn't work some of the time. Now that there are twenty-one computers to be used by students, these classes will be more profitable and more geared to life today.

There is a new class for the elementary children. This class teaches students the basic skills of keyboarding. It will make the keyboard more familiar to them when they get into their senior high and choose their classes.

As Mrs. McMullen describes it, "Morris has a great computer room and the possibilities are endless." MCS's computer room will help in making our students go far, because we are advancing technology and technology is success.

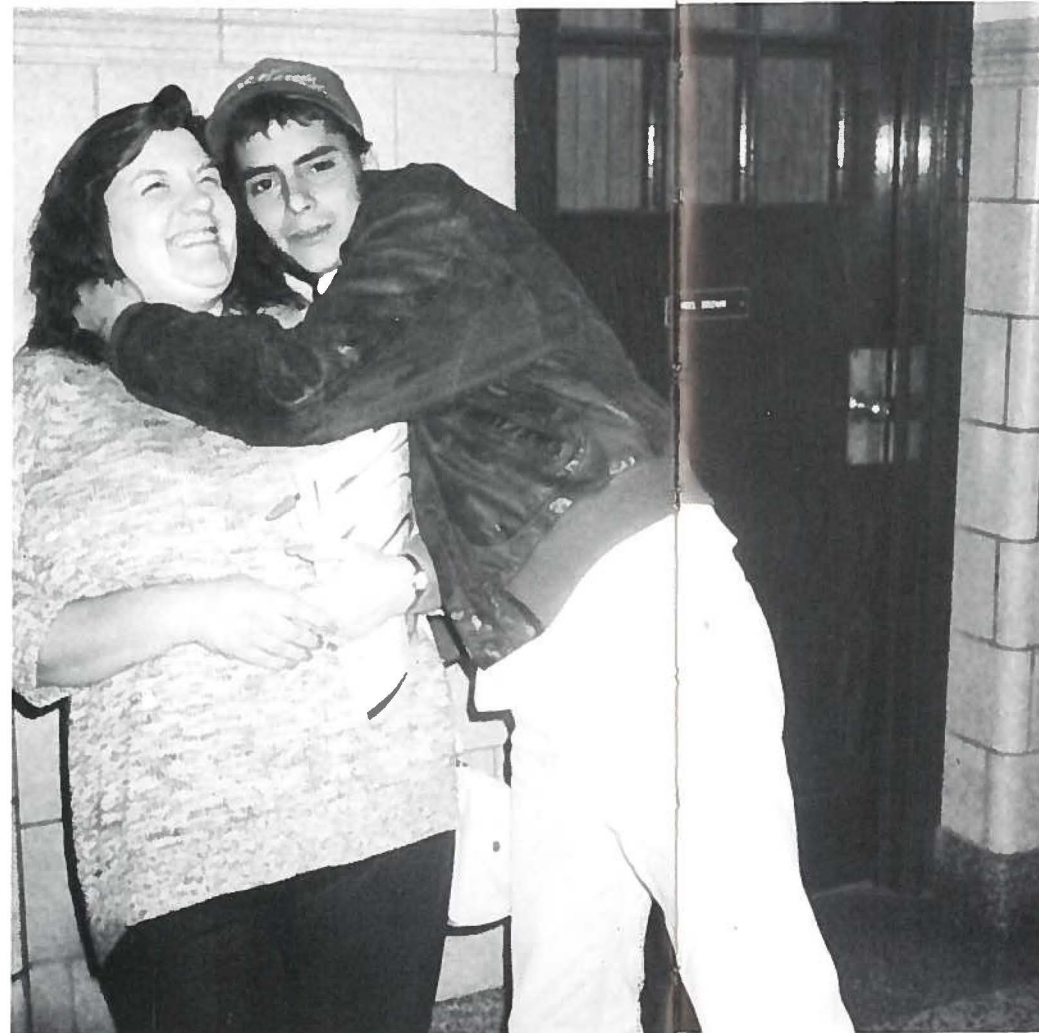

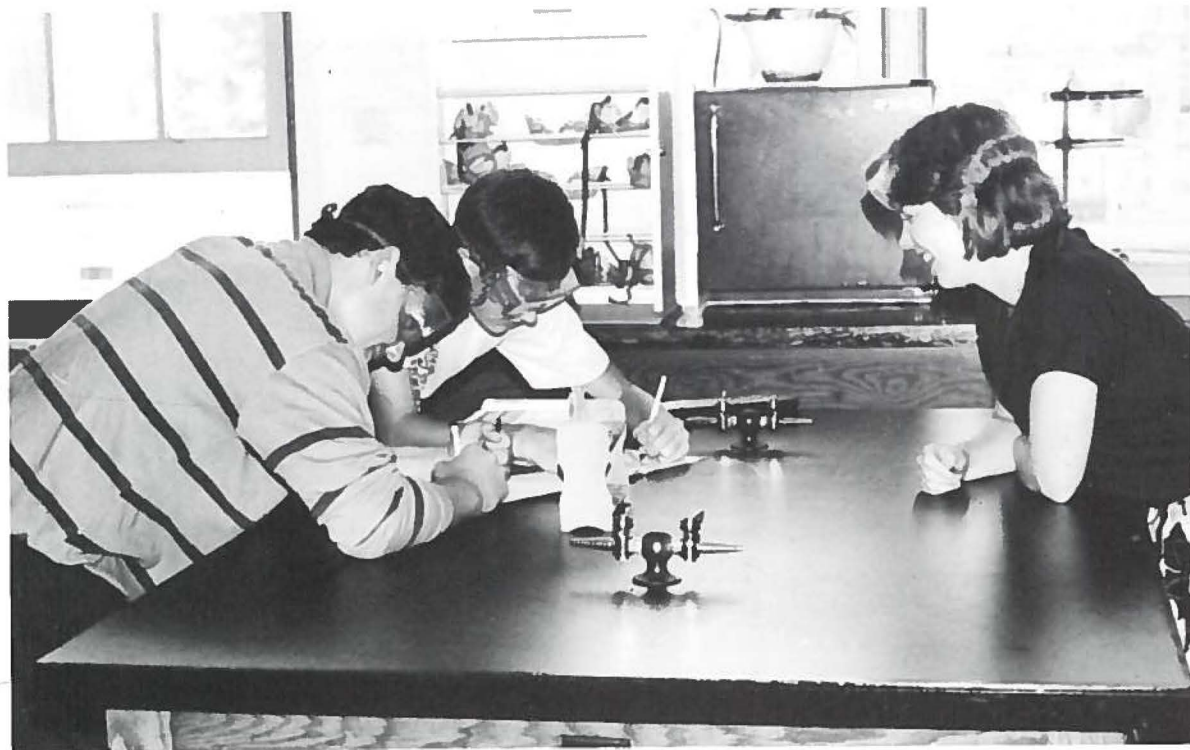

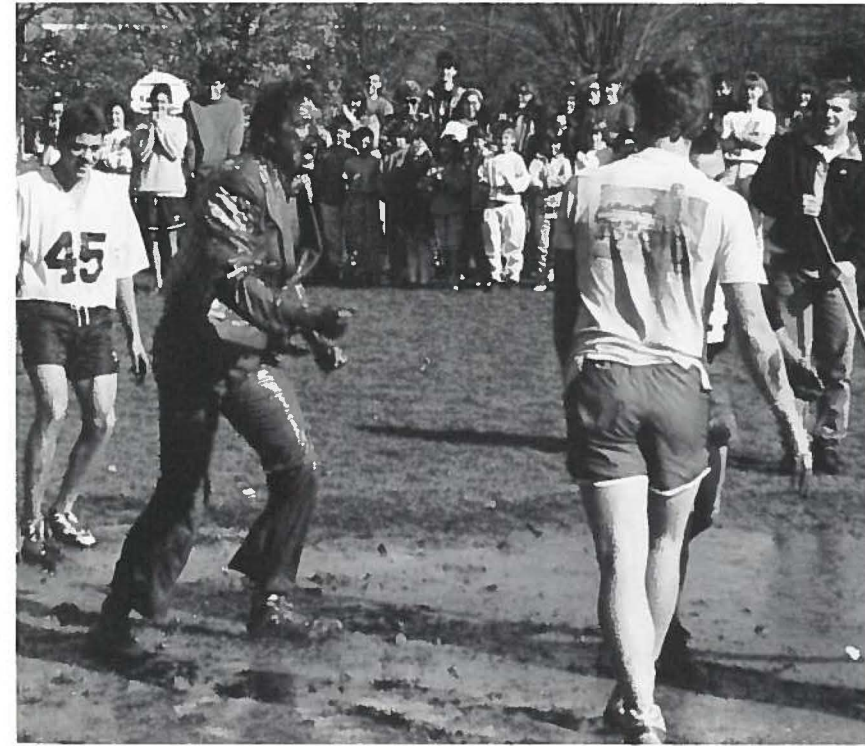

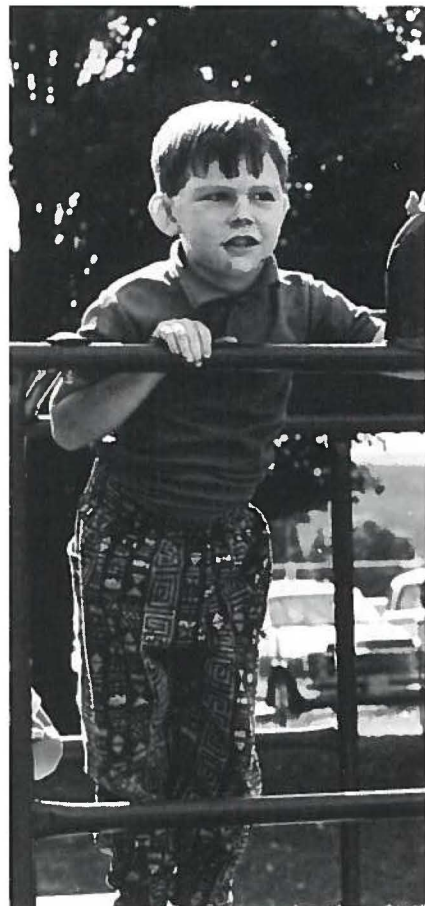

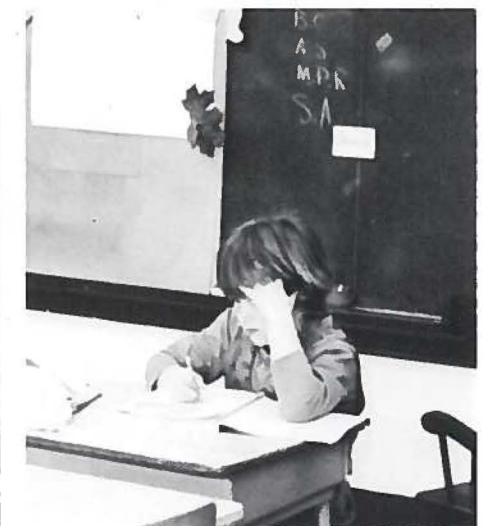

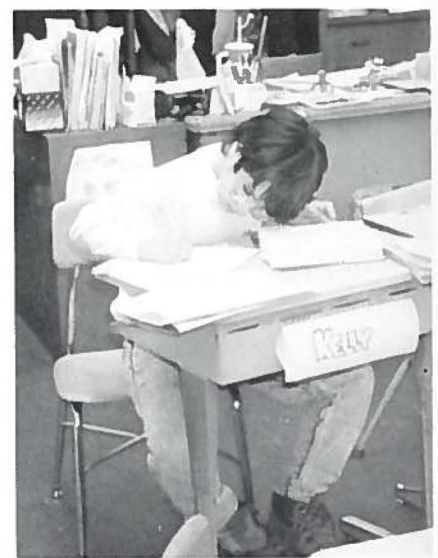

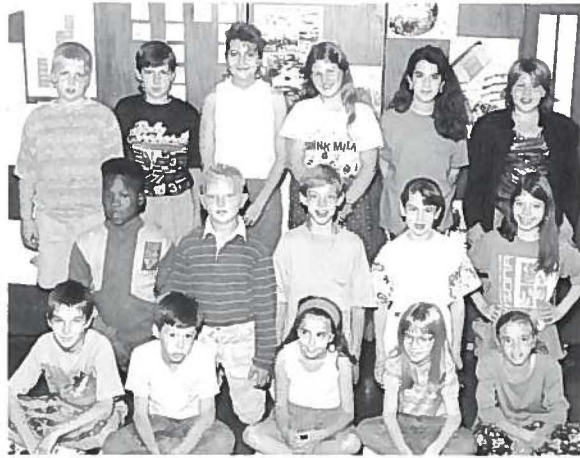

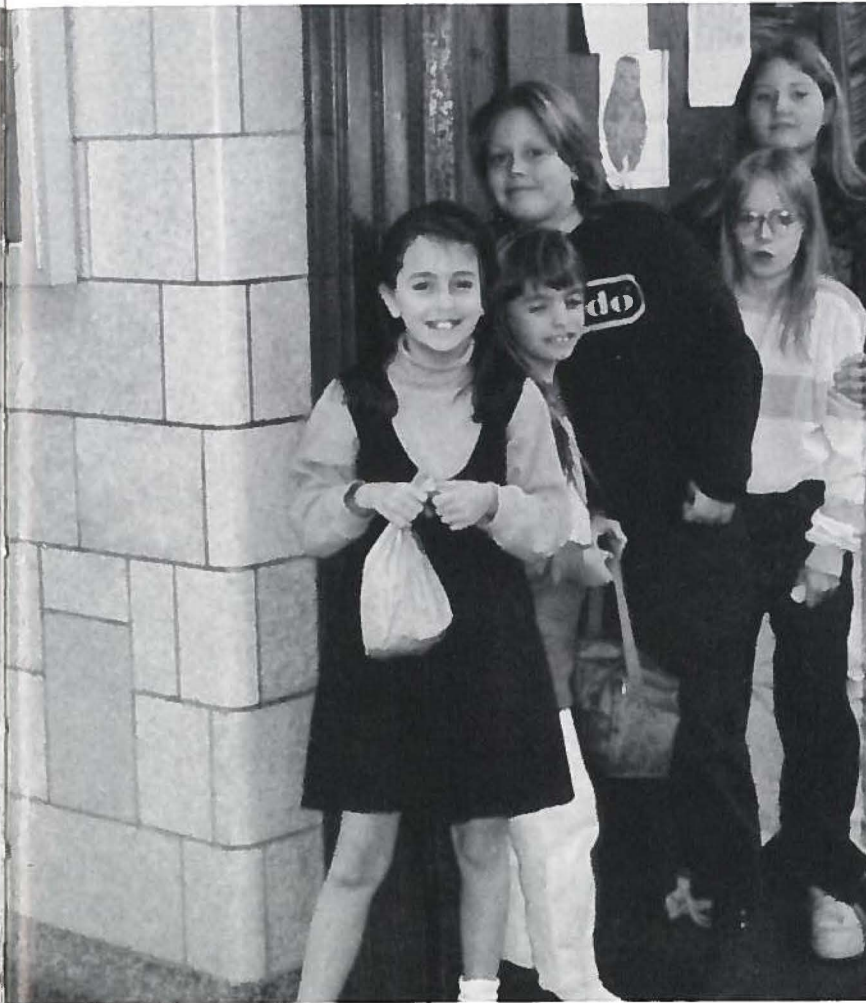

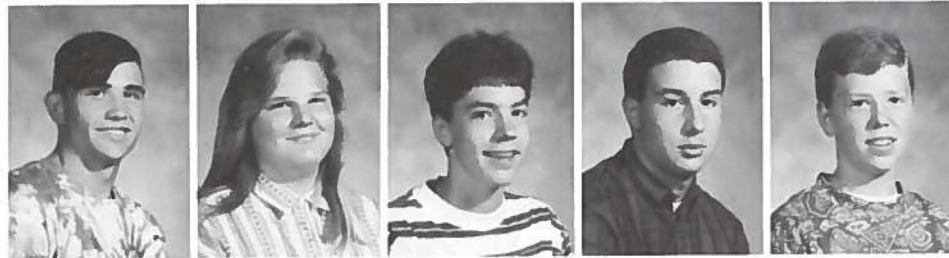

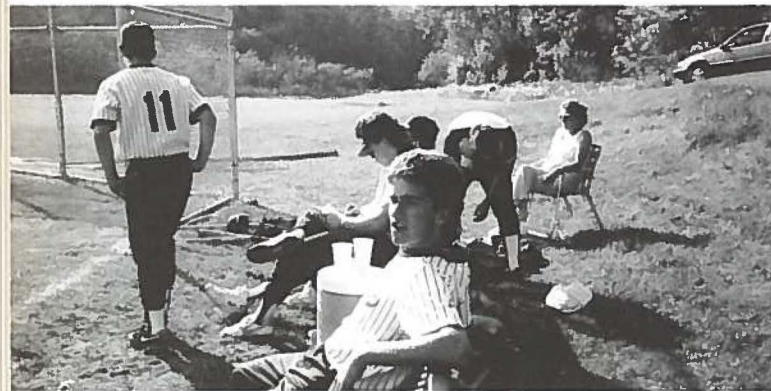
Spring is baseball, softball, and Little league. And the seasons go on and on. Our students can join a team today to have memories for tomorrow.

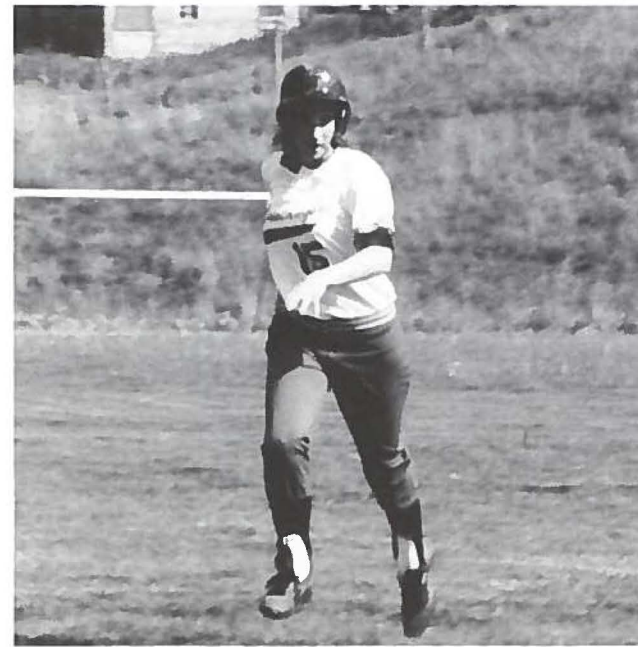

Hawks' Feathers Plucked After Thirteen Years.

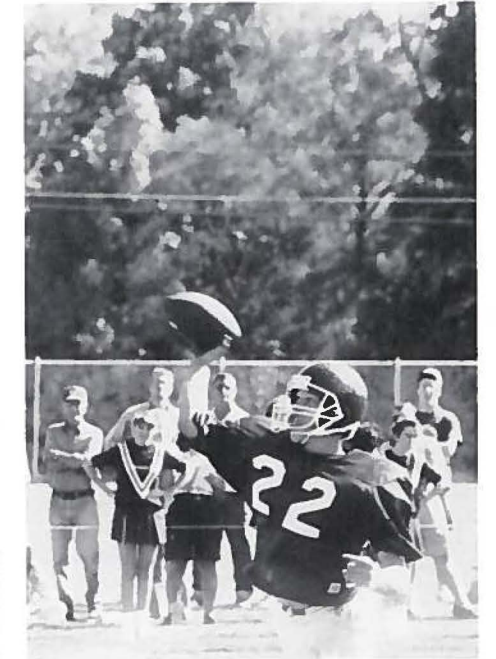

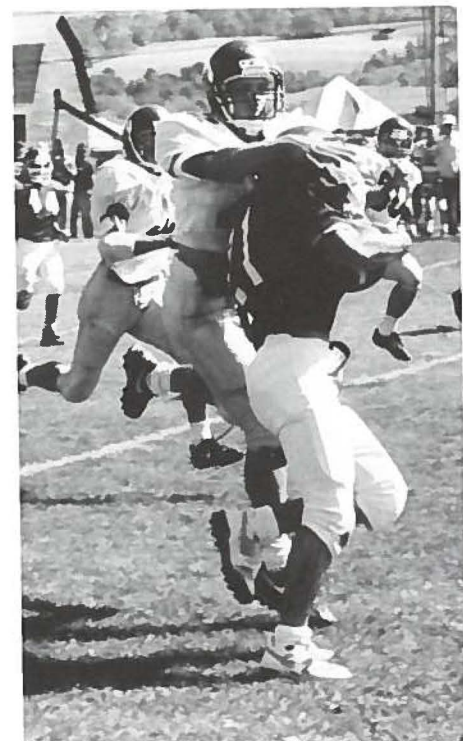

The girls made it into the first round of sectional play where they were defeated by Worester 1-0. Over all, the team placed second under GMU in the Tri-Valley West soccer league.

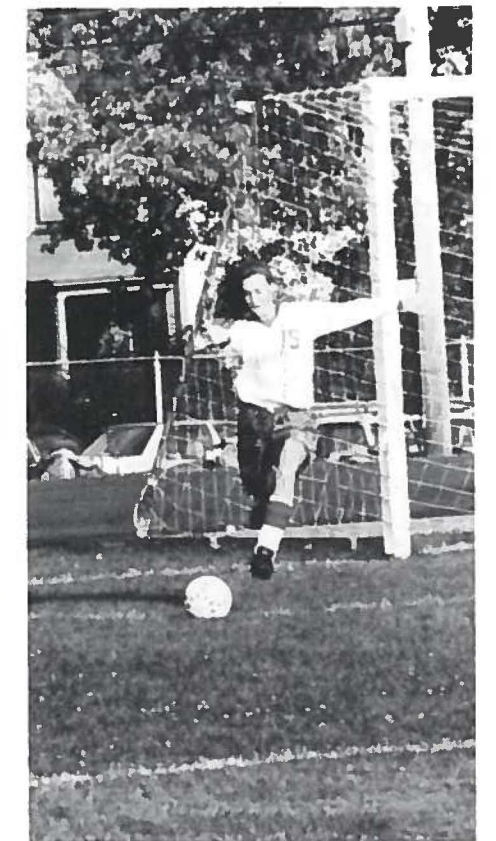

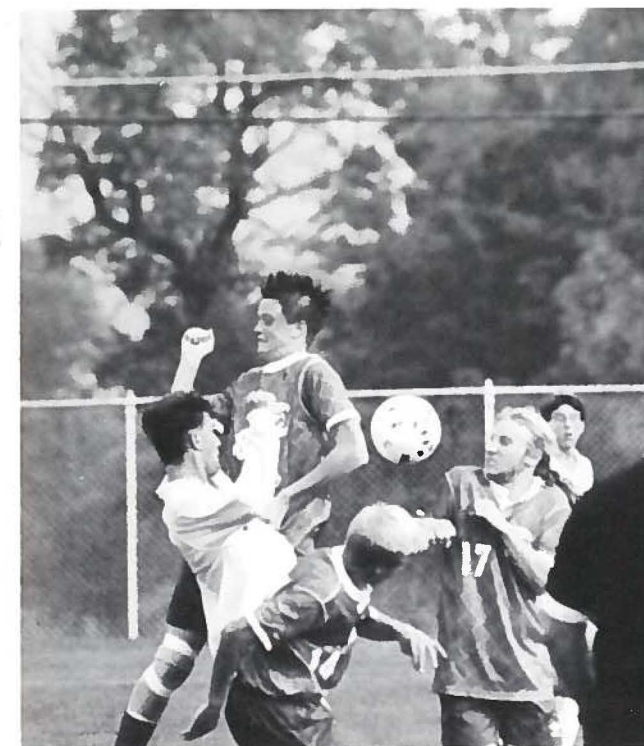

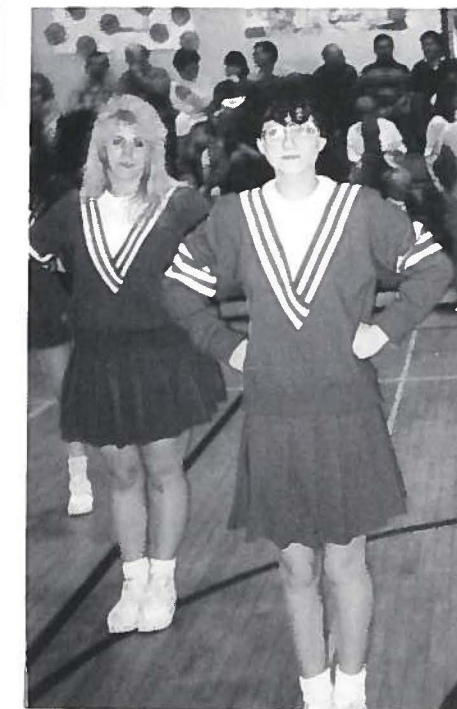

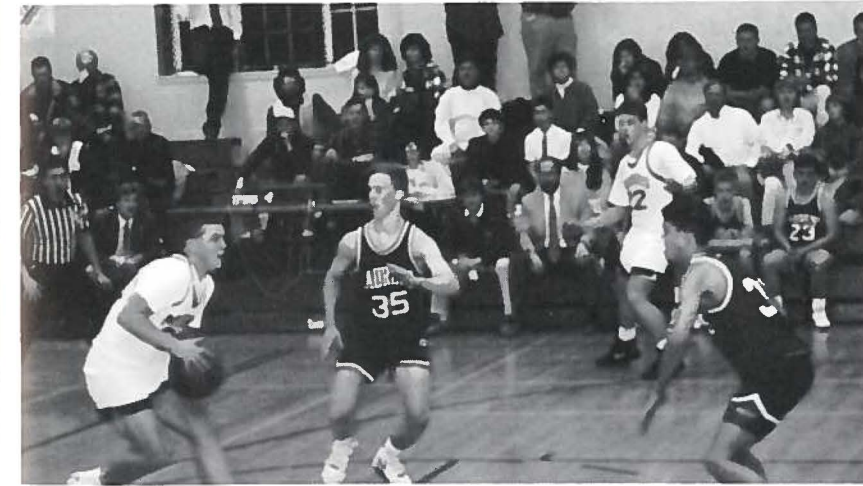

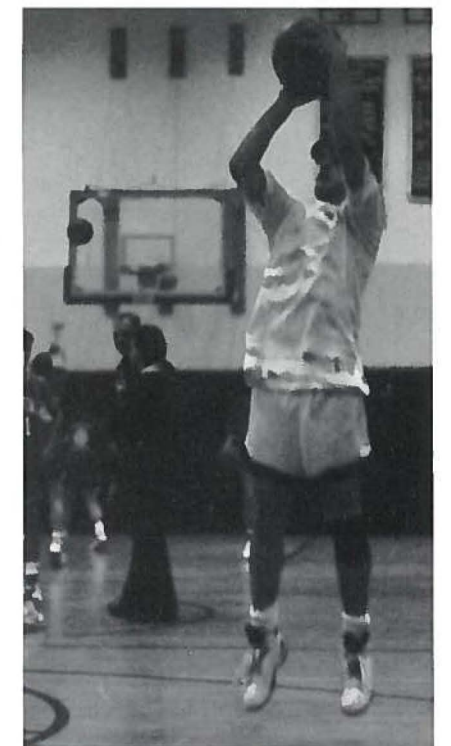

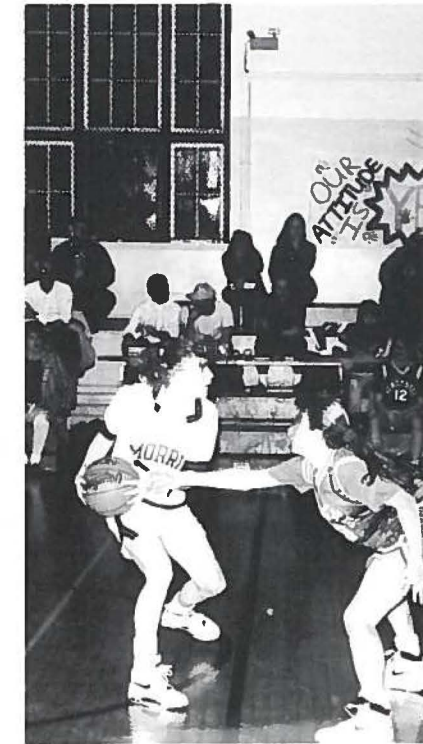

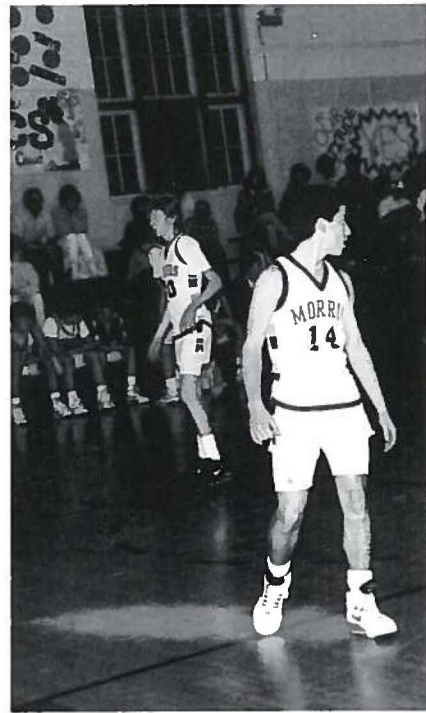

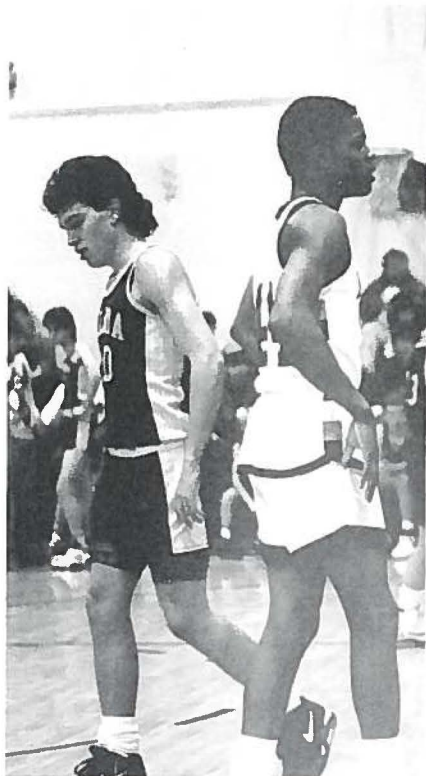
Coach Joy's believes that if everyone is assigned a job to do that he does well, and if he takes pride in his job, the team will be doing its best. That theory paid off for him this year.

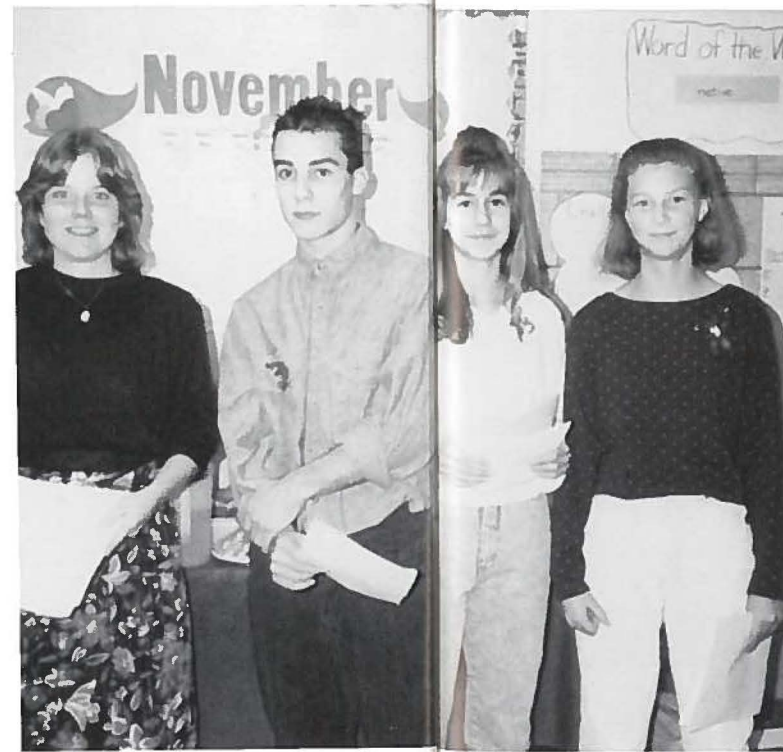

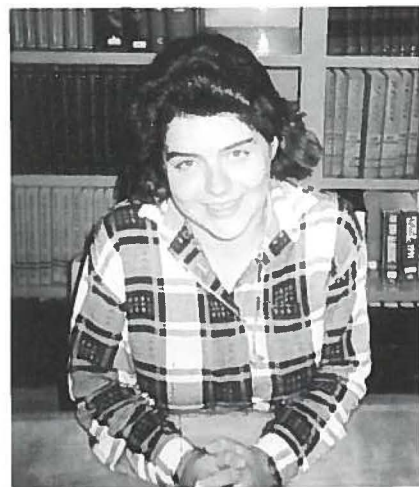
FBLA, FHA, Brain Games, SADD

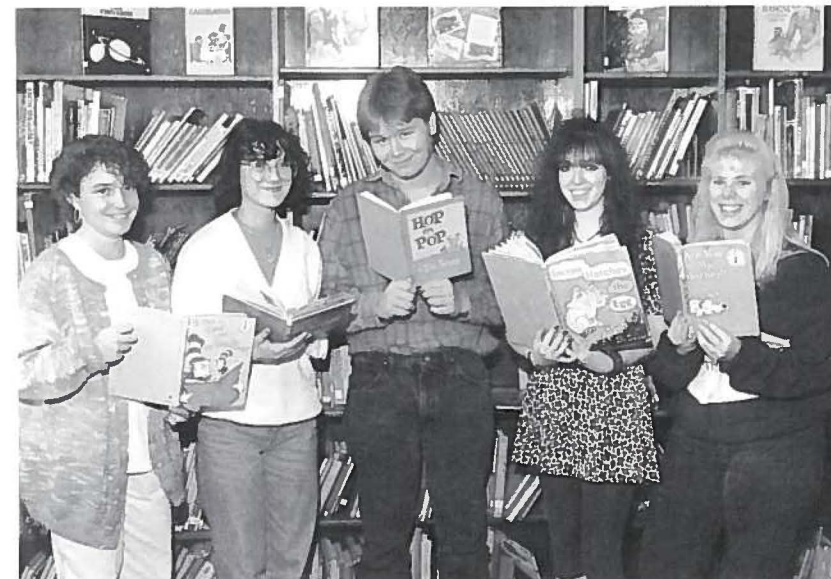

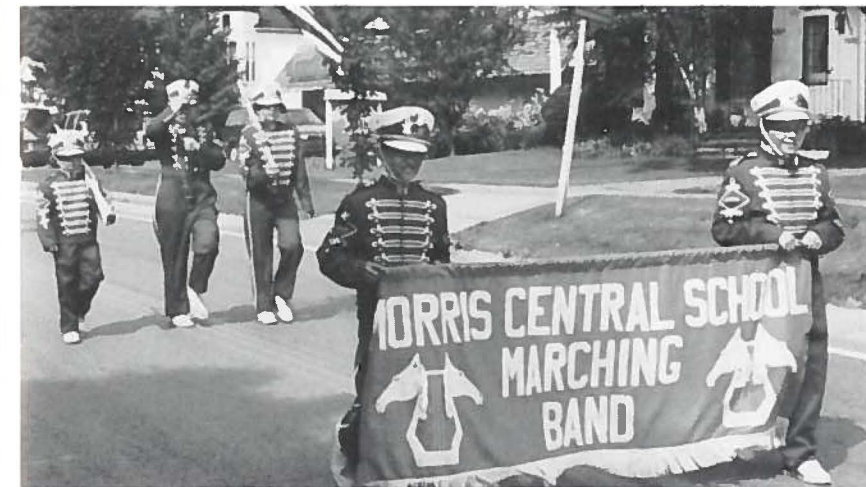

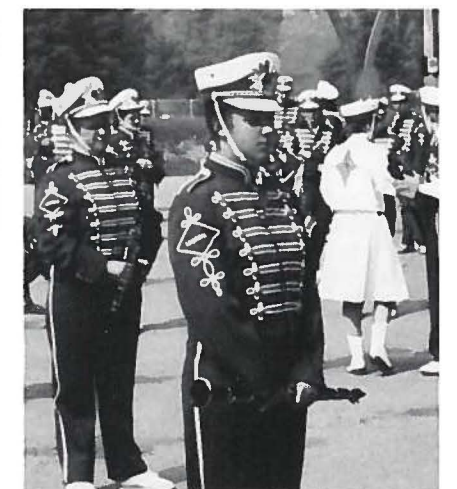

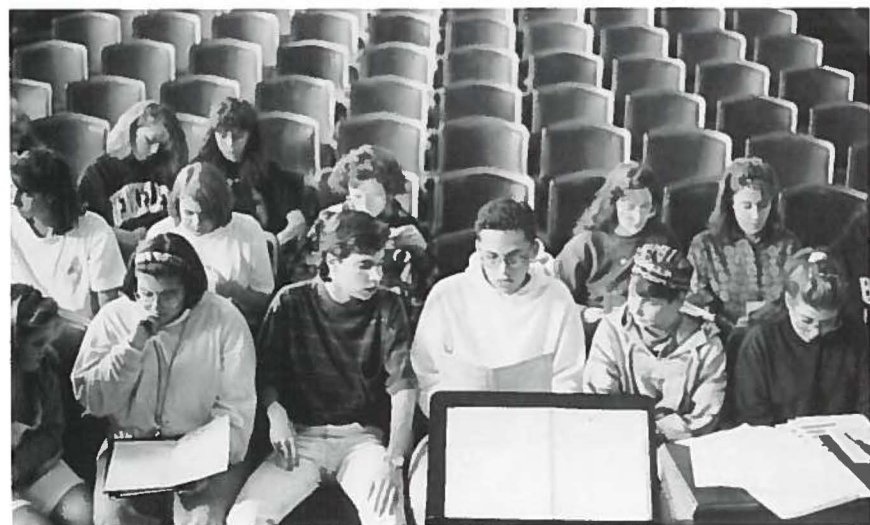
Senior High Music

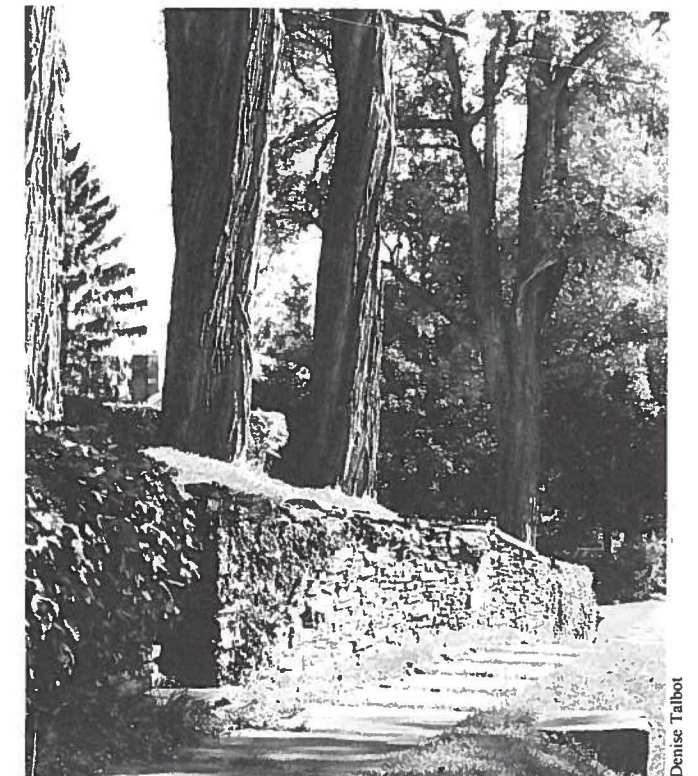

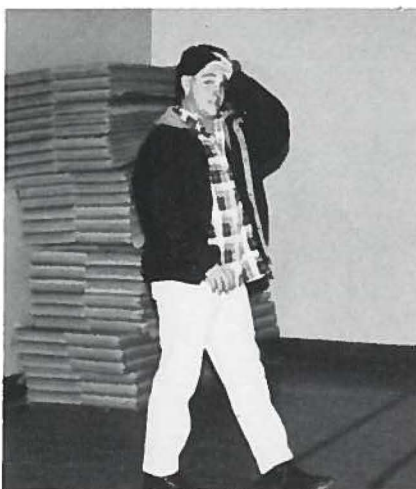
Malcolm enjoys his Creativity Class with Mr. Packard.

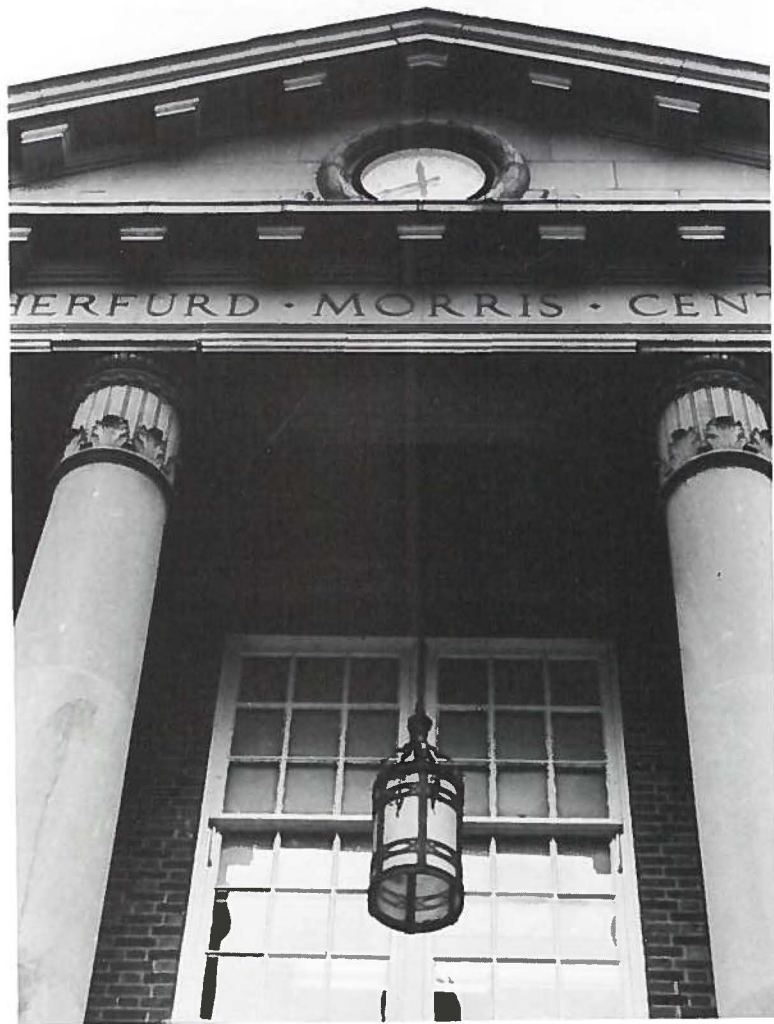
