He served in the Civil War and was left on the battlefield, supposedly dead, after the battle of Mary's Heights, Fredericksburg. It was three days and nights before he was found and given treatment. His wound necessitated that his left arm be amputated at the shoulder joint and he is said to nave been one of only three who survived such amputation in the war.
