7/26/24 The Klu Klux Klan met in South New Berlin last week. 9/13/24 The Morris **Turnpike is being extended** to meet the Morris Town line. 9/27/24 City water is being put in on the Morris fairgrounds and a concrete wall built in front of the grandstand next to the track. 9/27/24 Every motor vehicle operated in NYS must be licensed by October 1st or be subject to arrest. 10/4/24 The Morris fair is postponed until better weather. The fairgrounds are like a lake. Give serious thought to the following: in 1896 80% of the eligible voters in the U.S. voted; in 1900 73%; in 1908 66%; in 1912 62%, and in 1920, less than 50%. 1/31/25 A Linn tractor plowed out roads at West Burlington so now cars can run nicely. 2/21/25 Unguestionably the blizzard of last week was the greatest since those of 1914, when on Feb. 14th no less
