

Safety Patrol Poster Seeks Cooperation School Boys, Girls



WINNER 11TH NATIONAL TRAFFIC SAFETY POSTER CONTEST

The first AAA safety posters of the new school year are being distributed by the Tri County Motor Club. Theme of the bright red, white and blue poster is "Help Your Safety Patrol."

Fred G. Hickein, District Manager, said that achieving complete cooperation between the Patrol boys and girls and the youngsters they protect is the first objective of the elementary school safety program carried

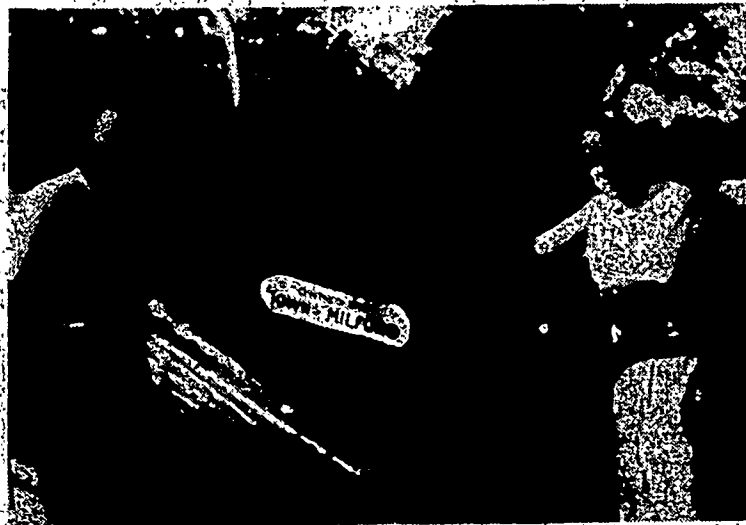
on in Tri County Area schools. "The record which the School Safety Patrol has made throughout the nation proves its effectiveness as a force for reducing traffic deaths and injuries among school children," Mr. Hickein said. "However, the Patrols are not a police force. They must rely on voluntary cooperation from other boys and girls, and that can only come about when the youngsters understand that the Patrols are there to help them."

The Motor Club official asked parents to stress with their own children the need for obeying signals of the Patrols as a supplement to the teaching they will get in school. He pointed out that repetition of the poster message is necessary to firmly establish it in young minds.

The poster, which is part of the Club's regular monthly safety education program, was designed by Richard Gurda, a senior at Collinwood High School, Cleveland, Ohio. Richard prepared the poster for the Eleventh National School Traffic Safety Poster Contest, sponsored by the American Automobile Association. The poster won a first prize in the senior division of the contest and was later selected by the judges for reproduction and national distribution.

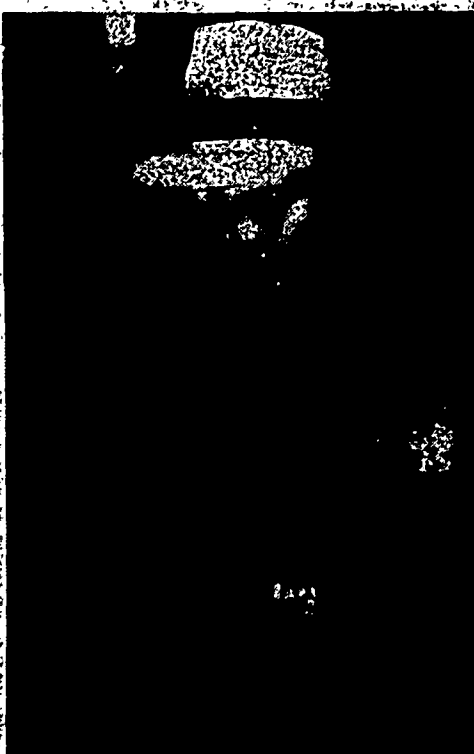

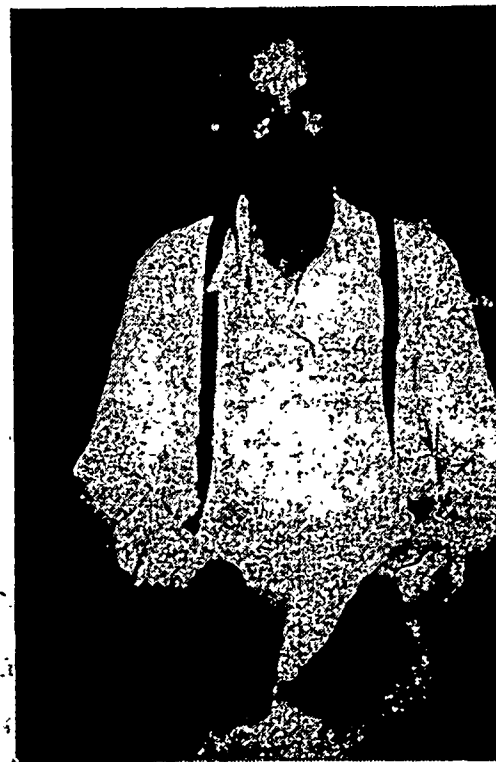
