
The Wenonah Historical Society is pleased to participate in StoryWalk.® Our story is "Fun Facts about Wenonah."

Fun Facts: Two Hotels

Wenonah House (1872-1887)

The Wenonah House, a majestic 3-story structure with 40 rooms, opened for guests in spring of 1872. There were only 10 houses in Wenonah. The hotel was located on S. Clinton Ave. across from the park. A boardwalk connected the hotel to the railroad station 2 blocks away.

The Wenonah House was only open during the summer.

Most guests staying at the Wenonah House arrived by train from Philadelphia.

the Wenonah House thrived until 1887, it changed ownership multiple times, and finally closed before being sold to founding father Stephen Greene for \$5,000.

Wenonah Inn (1894-1899)

The Wenonah House was demolished and a new hotel – the Wenonah Inn – opened on the same site in 1894. The Wenonah Inn accommodated 150 guests and included a barber shop, laundry, amusement hall, billiard room, and bowling alley.

The hotel became an instant success. On several occasions

special trains from Philadelphia brought patrons for large dances and other affairs. There even was an opera.

"booming." However, the boom was temporary. The Wenonah Inn closed in 1899 because automobiles made it easier to travel to more distant destinations.

Fun Facts: Wenonah Military Academy

The Wenonah Inn, which closed in 1899, became the Wenonah Military Academy.

The hotel's guest rooms were converted to classrooms, dormitory rooms, a library, a chapel, and an infirmary.

Later, a gymnasium/drill hall was constructed, a stone wall

was added along Clinton
Ave., and the building that
had housed the hotel's
bowling alley was
transformed into a science
laboratory.


The Wenonah Military
Academy opened its doors
on September 20, 1904.
The academy taught
grades 5-12 and offered
courses to prepare
students for either further
education or employment
soon after graduation.
Classes were small with 812 students.

Students came primarily from NJ, PA, NY, DE and OH, but some cadets came from as far away as South America, Mexico, Puerto Rico and Cuba.

A diploma from the academy entitled the graduate admission to West Point, Annapolis or one of the best

colleges or universities in the country, usually without qualifying tests.

The Wenonah Military
Academy closed for
economic reasons after the
1934-1935 school year, at
the peak of the Great
Depression. The land,
buildings, furniture,
equipment, books, linens,
and utensils were sold at a
sheriff's sale on October 18,
1935. Within a few years,
most buildings on the
academy campus were
demolished.





Fun Facts: Southwest Corner of Mantua & West Aves.

You're probably familiar with the building at the southwest corner of Mantua and West Aves. It's the home of Ananda Yoga + Wellness, Salon Maxima, and Wenonah Family Chiropractic. Did you know many other business establishments used that corner location as well? In fact, Wenonah's very first store, the Benjamin Packer Store, was located there in 1872. Later businesses included a convenience store, restaurant, cabinet store, and even a gas station.














On Pine St. between Marion and Clinton Aves.











Fun Facts: Did You Know?

The name of our town was almost spelled "Winona."



From Minutes of Mantua Land and Improvement Company

- The first ice cream parlor in South Jersey was in Wenonah at 7 & 9 W. Mantua Ave.
- The church bell at the former Methodist Episcopal Church (northeast corner of Clinton Ave. and Willow St.) was once used as the town's fire alarm.
- The first 4th of July celebration in Wenonah was in 1872. Activities ran from 5:00 AM to 11:30 PM. Supper was available at the Wenonah House for 50 cents.
- The train tracks originally ran along what is now N. Jefferson Ave. to just west of S. Jackson Ave.

- William Frederick Allen, who was responsible for the original street layout for Wenonah, created standard time and time zones that are still used worldwide.
- A YMCA was located at 6 N. Marion Ave. after the elementary school moved to its current location at Elm St. and Clinton Ave.
- Ice nearly a foot thick was "harvested" from Wenonah Lake in the late 1800's/early 1900's.
- The house at 100 S. West Ave. was constructed as a tavern before 1773. It was a stop for stage coaches traveling between Camden and Cape May.

Fun Facts: Contest Winners

Wenonah Public School Wins a Piano!

In 1895, the Philadelphia Times sponsored a contest open to all colleges, academies, and public and private schools in New Jersey. Ballots were printed in the daily and Sunday newspapers from October 19 through December 31. The two entrants that submitted the most ballots would win their choice of upright pianos.

The Wenonah Public School entered the contest against

great odds. At the time, there were only 100 families and 413 residents in town, including some staying at the Wenonah Inn. The winner of a similar contest for



Philadelphia schools submitted 199,000 ballots.

Despite the odds, Wenonah Public School amazingly won the contest and its choice of a piano with 411,000 ballots! Pretty amazing, don't you think?

Mrs. Frances Bossler Wins First Car in Wenonah!

On May 27, 1900, the Philadelphia Inquirer newspaper announced the Captain Kidd Hidden Picture Series Contest. Entrants had to identify 6 hidden objects in each of 9

puzzles. The grand prize was a 1900 Locomobile, valued at \$750.

Mrs. Frances Bossler, a 23-year-old resident of Wenonah, entered the contest and (with help from her husband) correctly identified the hidden objects in every puzzle. However, six others also solved the puzzles.

Mrs. Bossler was declared the contest winner after a blind draw. Her prize became



the first automobile to be owned by a Wenonah resident!

Fun Facts: Famous Visitors

Teddy Roosevelt

Teddy Roosevelt, the 26th president of the United States, spoke in Wenonah on May 24, 1912, while on a whistle-stop


tour through New Jersey.

Herb Pennock

Herb Pennock attended the Wenonah Military Academy. He excelled in baseball, basketball, and track and field.

At age 17, while still attending the academy, Herb was signed by baseball's legendary Connie Mack to pitch in the major leagues for the Philadelphia Athletics.


Herb went on to pitch for the Boston Red Sox and New York Yankees.

He pitched for the team some consider the greatest baseball team of all time — the 1927 New York Yankees. His teammates included Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig.

Herb Pennock was elected to the Major League Baseball Hall of Fame in 1948. His hall of fame plaque in Cooperstown, NY notes the jump from prep school (Wenonah Military Academy) to the majors.



Fun Facts: Soft Drinks, Soap and Medicine


In 1925, Pan American Products Corporation constructed a 2-story, 6,000-square-foot bottling plant on West Ave. near Cedar St. The plant was built to bottle Matteen, a new soft drink


formulated by Wenonah's Dr. Hamilton T. Mason, The plant was capable of bottling 1,000 cases per day.

The bottling plant closed less than 3 years after opening.

The building that housed the bottling plant was later used by the New Jersey Tex Company to manufacture cleaning products and Clark & Clark to manufacture pharmaceutical products. It became known to many as the "pill factory."

The pill factory was ravaged by fires in 1969 and 1971.




Grandstand at Cedar Field

- Belford G. Royal, who lived at 500 E. Mantua Ave., was part of a team that invented the disc record.
- More than 60 trains passed through Wenonah each day in the late 1890's.

- The Memorial Presbyterian Church is the only structure in Wenonah on the National and New Jersey Registers of Historic Places.
- The first industry in Wenonah was a factory that canned 250,000 pounds of tomatoes per year in the 1880's.
- In 1890, the price of lots averaged about \$200.
- Before Wenonah, the land here consisted of sweet potato farms.
- Wenonah Lake once had a diving tower.




Diving Tower at Wenonah Lake




