Election Notice.

NOTICE is hereby given, pursuant to statute,
that on the 29th day of July, 1870, between
the hours of ten o'clock in the forenoon and three
o'clock in the afternoon at the hotel lately oc-
cupied by George N. Goodrich in the village of
Louisville, Otsego County, N. Y., an election,
will be held to determine whether the territory
(as embraced in a survey and map heretofore
made, and filed in the Banking office of A. G.
Moore & Co.) shall be incorporated pursuant
to the provisions of an act of Legislature passed
February 26th, 1870, under and by the name of
"Morris" to be bounded as follows: Beginning at
a stake and stone standing on the west bank of
the Butternut creek on lands of Francis Rotch,
and running thence north 75° west 39 chains and
20 links to a hard maple tree standing on lands
of H. R. Washbon; Thence north 68° 30' west
20 chains and 48 links to a maple tree standing
near the fence on the south side of the Butternut
creek road; Thence north 20° 30' west 15 chains
and 96 links to a stake and stone on lands of
the said H. R. Washbon; Thence north 31° 30' east
12 chains and 45 links to the road leading from
Morris to Dimmock Hollow; Thence north 47°
35' east 42 chains and 67 links to a stake and
stone standing by the side of a stone wall; Thence
south 87° east 33 chains and 76 links to a corner
of lands of Jonah Davis and Peleg Weedon;
Thence south 53° east on lands of H. R. Van
Rensselaer 27 chains and 65 links to a corner of
lands of A. S. Avery, (the centre of the Butternut
creek road); Thence south 40° east on said
Avery's line and on lands of R. Leonard 23
chains and 96 links to the northerly bank of the
Butternut creek; Thence in the same direction
across the said creek to a corner on the southerly
bank thereof; Thence down the southerly and
easterly bank of said creek as it winds and turns
to a corner on said bank made by extending the
line first above described south 76° east across
said creek to the easterly bank thereof; Thence
north 75° west across the said creek to the place
of beginning containing Five Hundred acres of
