



L. P. Carpenter was a man of strong likes and dislikes, and his fault was in making this evident many times when it would have been policy not to do so, but he was a man often misunderstood because of his brusque blunt manner of speech more than often this manner was assumed to cover his real feelings, which were more than usually sympathetic and tender, sufstand, and his unselfish liberality in helping such, and lavish giving to those he loved, assisted not a little in keeping him financially a comparatively poor man. He was a member of the Baptist denomination, as were his ancestors before him, and as have been thus far his descendants after him. He was always a liberal supporter of all the interests of his church. For twenty three years up to 1895 he was the corresponding secretary of the Otsego Baptist Association, and as such had formed a wide acquaintance throughout the denomination He was baptized in Otsego Lake, and the other young lad who accompanied him into the baptismal waters of those long-gone days is still living, and the friend ship between them was only strengthened as the years have passed.
