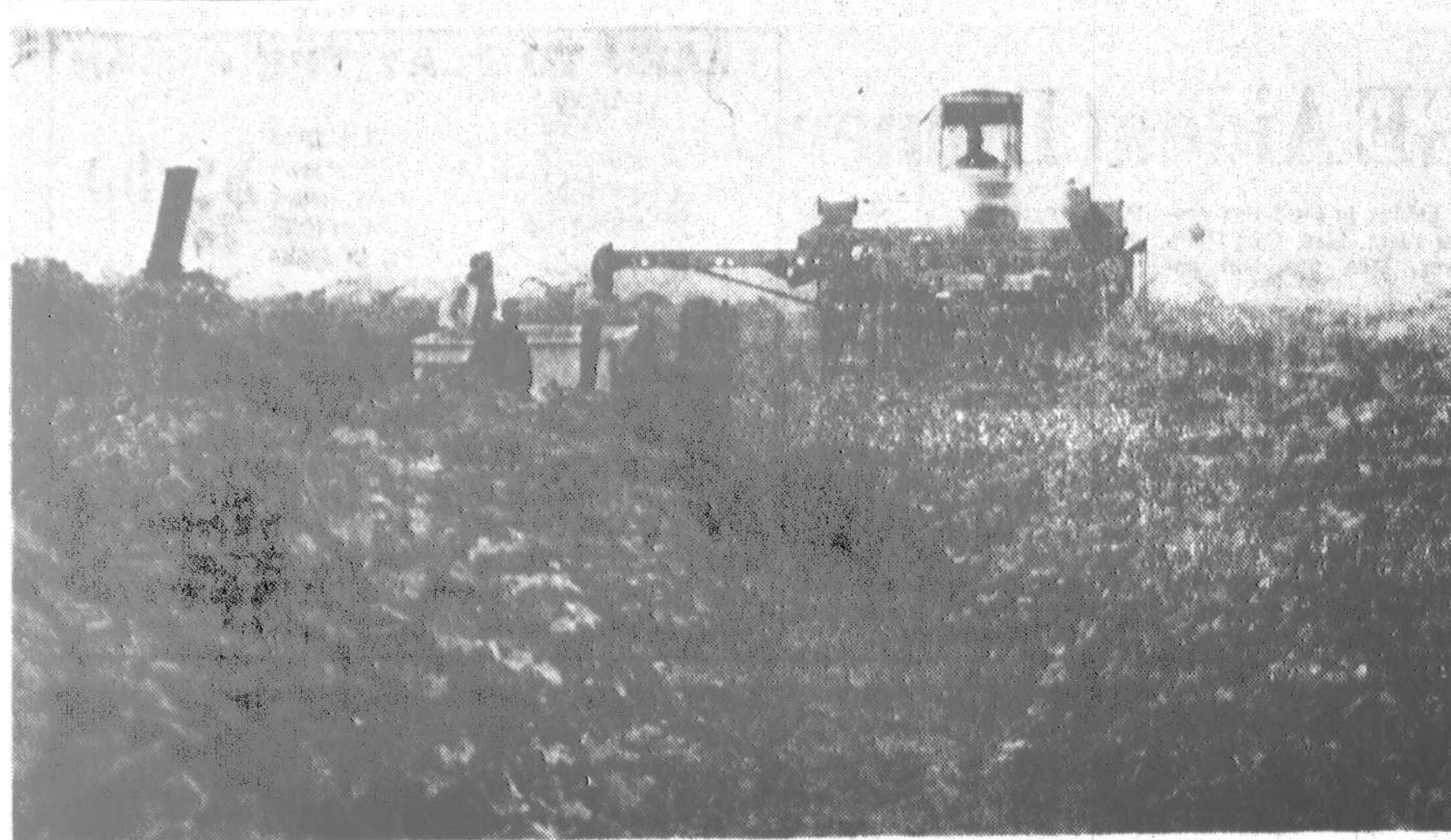


Gospel Festival College Plans Music Fair

GLASSBORO, Sept. 17. — Glassboro State College will sponsor its first Black Gospel Festival at 8 P. M. Thursday in the Esbjornson Gymnasium. Groups and soloists from Philadelphia, Camden, Atlantic City and Glassboro will present traditional and contemporary gospel music. The program is cosponsored by the Student Cultural Exchange Board and the King Scholar Program.

Air Crash Victims Returned

The ashes of Bryant W. Langston, 60, and his wife, Sue 57, were sent to Wenonah on Wednesday from Albuquerque, N. M. Langston, brother-in-law of U. S. Secretary of State William P. Rogers, was killed with his wife Monday in Santa Fe when their twin-engine plane crashed and burned in an arroyo about two miles from the airport they had just left. No services were held at Albuquerque cremation. George Witchel, a relative of the victims, said no date or time had been set for funeral services in New Jersey. Langston, said to be a veteran pilot, was president of Langston Corp., of Camden, which manufactures machinery used in making cardboard. He was the brother of Rogers' wife, Adelle Langston Rogers. The Langstons had purchased their plane in California, and were flying it to Florida. The plane crashed into the arroyo and exploded, apparently killing the victims instantly. Federal Aviation Agency and Civil Aeronautics Board investigators were still looking into the accident. Witnesses at the airport said the plane appeared to be having engine trouble as it taxied and that the engines failed shortly after takeoff. 2 Candy Strippers Honored

Two Candy Strippers will be honored Friday by John F. Kennedy Memorial Hospital in Stratford as they leave to begin nursing careers. Mary Anne Acquarole and Sharon Bierce, both of Stratford, will receive special awards at a capping ceremony at 8:15 P. M. in Sterling High School, Stratford.

They will be among 60 Candy Strippers who have logged more than 30,000 hours of volunteer service since the hospital opened in 1965. A. R. Pirolli, hospital administrator, said.

Miss Acquarole will receive the first prize for contributing 1231 hours of service. The president of the teenage Candy Stripper group, she will enter Jefferson School of Practical Nursing.

Miss Bierce, a first-year student at West Jersey School of Nursing, volunteered 570 hours. She expects to specialize in obstetrics when she completes her initial training.

According to Pirolli, during the past year the Candy Strippers volunteered 7113 hours at hundreds of hospital tasks from feeding patients to assisting the clerical staff.

TRENTON, Sept. 17. — A former assistant U. S. attorney was appointed a judge of the Workmen's Compensation Court by Commissioner Raymond F. Male of the Department of Labor and Industry.

Robert W. Page, 34, of Pennsauken, who had held the Federal post in Camden since 1964, was appointed to the usual life term on the court. His starting salary will be \$17,735 and increase to \$23,057 in six years.

Page will receive a month's training before being assigned to a particular section of the state.

Gloucester to Seek \$50,000 for Library

A drive to raise \$50,000 to furnish the new Gloucester City Library will be launched next week. Pamphlets explaining the drive will be distributed by the Jaycees and Boy Scouts from Thursday to Dec. 24, according to chairman Allen R. Hubbs.

\$56,000 GRANT Gloucester City Council has appropriated \$275,000 for the new library to be built on the municipal parking lot between Hudson and Monmouth sts. However, this amount will cover construction costs only.
