

## Edwin R. Burger Jr., 77, former mayor of Wenonah

Edwin R. Burger Jr., 77, former councilman and mayor of Wenonah who was a longtime businessman in the small Gloucester County borough, died of cancer Friday, Nov. 5, at his retire-ment home in Summerfield,

Fla.
Even before he became involved in town politics, Mr. Burger was a Mr. Wenonah.
"He was an active person around town ... was involved in Little League," said former Wenonah Mayor Jack Sheppard, who suggested Mr. Burger fill a vacant council seat in the 1980s. "He was a natural for that."

Mr. Burger, along with his father, Edwin Burger Sr., founded Edwin R. Burger &

They started out doing

home remodeling and kitchen repairs, said son Edwin Burg-er 3d. Then they started put-

ting in storm windows and fences, for which they became well known.

Mr. Burger was always working on some project. "If he didn't have a job, he wasn't happy," his son

Mr. Burger retired Edwin R. from the family business in 1997. His sons now run it.

He served on Borough

Council from 1982 to 1994, when he was elected mayor.

As mayor, Mr. Burger was one of the main people to push for the current Town Hall, which houses the Po-lice Department, public works, courthouse, and oth-er municipal offices, his son

Aside from that project, Mr. Burger focused on keeping Wenonah intact, complete with the small-town charm its residents value, Sheppard

Elected mayors usually try to preserve Wenonah the way they found it and not intrude too much, Sheppard said. He added that Mr.

Son Fence Co. in Barnsboro Burger fit that description and was "totally devoted to the community. Honest and sincere

Mr. Burger served as mayor through 2002. Six years later, he moved to Florida with his wife, Jean.
Mr. Burger was born in Philadelphia and moved to Manand moved to Man-tua when he was a young boy. He gradu-ated from Pitman High School in 1953, and in 1954 he mar-ried his high school sweetheart, Jean L

The couple lived in Mantua until 1963, when they

moved to Wenonah.

In addition to his wife and son, Mr. Burger is survived by sons Frank and Mark, daughter Sheree Watson; his mother, Alva M. Burger; eight grandchildren; and seven greatgrandchildren.
