An illness of 15 months yesterday resulted in the death of Miss Mary W. Rea, president of the Fifth Ward Woman's Republican Club, and proprietor of a candy and cigar store and subpostoffice at 287 Kaigh avenue.

Miss Rea was a sister of Leo Rea, Republican registrar of the Camden County Board of Election, and Joseph, a court house attaché. She was the daughter of Mrs. Bridget Rea and the late Philip Rea. She is also survived by two other brothers, Peter P. of Camden, and Philip V. of Gloucester, and a sister, Miss Catherine M. Rea.

Miss Rea was president of the Republican club for 10 years and was active in civic affairs in South Camden. She was born in Camden and lived her entire life here. She was a lifelong member of Sacred Heart Church. She was active in the church and a member of the Blessed Virgin Sodality.

The funeral will be held at 9 a. m. Monday, at the Kaigh avenue address. Solemn high requiem mass will be held at 10 a. m. at Sacred Heart Church.

**WRITING TEACHER DIES
AFTER AUTO ACCIDENT**
Michael J. Ryan, widely known as a penmanship instructor and long a teacher at the Purcell school, died in the 1970. Ryan from a fatal early yesterday after being struck by a motor car at 230 a. m. at Lancaster and Warner avenues.

Bryon Meyer, Pa. Ryan, who was 62 and lived at 2400 North Sixth street, Philadelphia, suffered a fractured skull. He was struck just after alighting from a motor bus in Bryon Meyer, where he had gone to spend the holiday with friends.

The car which hit Ryan was operated by Harold Buehler, 77 Pine street, near Eighth, a medical student at the University of Pennsylvania, whose home is in Baginam, Mich. He was arrested by Lower Merion police.

Ryan resided at the Sixth street address more than 40 years with a sister, who teaches in the public school. He was the author of several text books on penmanship.

**WILLIAM WYAND DIES
AFTER 3-YEAR ILLNESS**
Absecon, Nov. 26. — William Wyand, 74, combustion engineer and inventor died yesterday in Atlantic Shores Hospital, Seaside Point, after an illness of three years.

He was a former resident of Collingswood and a member of the Sea company there 10 years. He moved to Absecon 22 years ago and was one of the organizers of Oake Fire Company here.

Among his inventions were a grate for burning small size coal and brakes for ferris wheels. He maintained an experimental shop until shortly before his death.

He is survived by his wife, Julia W., a daughter, Mrs. Irene Purraz of Absecon, a son, William W., of Atlantic City, and two brothers, Robert R. of Camden, and John L. of Philadelphia.

**OSCAR D. OGDEN DIES,
EX-WENONAH MAYOR**
Wenonah, Nov. 26. — Former Mayor Oscar D. Ogden, 67, died suddenly yesterday of a heart attack at his home, 106 North Princeton avenue.

He was stricken Wednesday night. Ogden was born at Bridgeton and had lived here about 20 years. He received two terms as mayor, from 1920 to 1928. He was a member of the state firm of Bell-Whit & Co., Philadelphia.

Ogden was an elder of the Presbyterian church and a member of Masonic Lodge, F. & A. M. He is survived by his widow, two daughters and a son, Mrs. Frank B. Burt.

frightened and ran away from somebody and in the dark tumbled into the ditch. They said she had apparently been attacked because hair of her clothing was missing.

When last seen she was leaving a restaurant and got into an automobile with three men at Atlantic and Mansfield avenues, according to a waitress and friends.

Mortuary said that on the night of October 27 he and his wife went to a downtown saloon. He said they returned and that he left with her at 2:10 a. m. He said his wife had been in a motor car with relatives each time going to live with relatives in Philadelphia before returning to Camden.

He said he believed his wife had left death for Philadelphia and that he had heard nothing of her until he was advised the body being found.

According to Captain Perretti, Mrs. Mortuary was seen at 5 p. m. October 27, in the Atlantic avenue restaurant. She had been drinking, he said, and refused to pay her check, several other women diners nearby.

Her identity was established 15 minutes before City Detective William Horvath of Camden telephoned here to give police a description of a woman missing in Camden. The Camden woman is Mrs. Vivian Rome, 27, reported missing from her boarding house at 901 Cooper street since November 23 by the owner, Mrs. Mary Johnson.
