PLANNING TO PLACE BLAME FOR THE WRECK

Coroner Impanels Jury of Well-Known Citizens and Will Probe Atlantic City Horror to the Bottom

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 29.—With a score of victims lying in a long gruesome row on either side of them, the members of the coroner's jury which is to probe into Sunday's wreck to determine where the blame of the accident shall be placed, today took solemn oath to fulfill their important duty. It was perhaps the first time that a jury has been sworn under such dramatic circumstances and it made a deep impression upon the few persons who witnessed the scene. That it impressed the jury-men was evidenced by the earnestness with which they worked today.
